

COMMODORE'S LOG

Club House, Club House and Club House. That is the big news of the month. How is the remodeling coming and more importantly, when will it be finished? The short story is: We will have the March General meeting in the newly remodeled Club House (yaw)! I had the opportunity to be at the Club House after dark the other night and was pleased and surprised how well the place looked, even in its unfinished state. The new lights down the side aimed on the freshly painted walls add richness to the place that you can only imagine. It really looks sharp. The remodeling Committee has done a wonderful job organizing the project. The construction crew has been working every day



The dredging is now completed for the year. The river bottom has once again been picked up and put in the parking lot. Most of the moorage is at the desired depth for the seasonal low water and will not impact our boating activities. The dredge is put away for the season. The dredge pond is full. The dredge pipe is put away and my thanks to Bob, Fred, and the crew for cleaning up the corner where the dredge lives.

The first work party is March 13th. I have asked Jim to start cleaning up the west end of the Parking lot. Jim plans to mark everything with a dollop of paint that will be thrown away. That means that if you have anything that you have stored



there and still want to keep, you had better find a way to get it out of there. There is a mast that does not have a boat attached that is in jeopardy. There are trailer parts that appear to not be needed. These things will all be removed. The Chapel will be cleaned out and anything that does not have a use will be disposed of. Things that might be useful someday will in all likelihood go. There is no space available. The scrap metal, tires, flotation blocks, and any other thing which does not have a use, will all go. We will keep the fuel barrels.

The fire at Columbia River Yacht Club last winter has really piqued everybody's interest in insurance, especially fuel spill liability. We are relying on each individual member to provide coverage for this item. If they don't, we will all be liable. What can we do to correct this? Tyee Yacht

MOORAGE MATTERS:

There's a memorable scene in the movie, Wizard of Oz, where Toto tugs aside the curtain and reveals the man who is actually the "Great Wizard" and he tells Dorothy and her pals to "Pay no attention to the man behind the curtain!"

Well, sometimes members make me feel a little bit like that character... Except there is no curtain and of course I'm not the Wizard. There are some influential members in the background, but I am not one of them. And, be assured that the Commodore is the only real "Wiz" around here (no curtain, either)!

Starting with the routine assigning of boats to empty slips and notifying the bookkeeper of the charges, the job of Moorage Chair has slowly grown to "maximizing the use of the moorage" by shifting boats to allow more members to moor here. And beyond that, I have progressed to petitioning the Board for continuing upgrades to our docks and slips. I also have been drawn closer into working with the Officers, the Work Party Chair, and the Residents in contributing input on needed repairs and upgrades to the docks.

It is sometimes uncomfortable asking someone to move to another slip, for the general good of the club. But since only Walk One has (mostly) uniform slip widths, I do have to occasionally ask members to change slips. There are very few uniform slip widths on the other walks, and that's the ongoing problem. With that in mind, I hope to complete a two-boat move that will open up a big and wide slip on walk one, later this spring.

Remember, we walk a thin line when recruiting new members -- between reassuring them of a slip within XX number of months or discouraging them with too long of a predicted wait to moor. In theory, their enthusiasm for being active members of such a fine yacht club should rise above their desire to moor their boat here, but human nature just doesn't work that way. In asking a family to orient (some of) their leisure time and labor around RCYC, they really need to, ultimately, have their boat inside the moorage.

As to what is acceptable, "on the average", for a wait to get a slip, I sense that a year is almost too long. I see the change in the face of a prospective member when I tell them the vague but realistic truth about how soon we can find room for their boat. With our members always recruiting, coupled with our fine facility, we should continue to have more applicants than we have slips. I want you all to be aware that if the Moorage Chair were to *only* fill an empty slip with a boat that happened to fit that exact slip, we would have constant empty slips, a longer waiting list, and fewer active members.

So, when Moorage Rule A. I.a. is invoked to make a move "for the best interest of the Club," someone may dislike the change. Ditto for changes made under A. I. b. in the same section, which also authorizes moorage moves. Having said all that to explain one of the more stressful parts of my duties, I would regret asking anyone to make a change that turns out to be unneeded. I do appreciate your input in utilizing our moorage to: Benefit the Highest Number of Active Member Families Possible. That's the goal.

As to the moorage itself, by the time this hits print, the dredge will be put away, walk 5 slips and boats should be back in place, the pond will have a mountain of sand to be gotten rid of, and I can set about integrating some new member boats into our moorage.

Please note: between remodeling the clubhouse and operating the dredge, we now easily have over 40 members each with over 40 (or 80+) work hours already for this year. Please try to schedule yourself for several Saturday work parties to get our facility in shape for the summer. Many hands really do make light work.

Since you have been nagged, nearly every month, to have big fenders, strong lines, and your current registration stickers on, it seemed appropriate to take a short 'time out' to talk about moorage philosophy.




I am pleased to inform all of you that the year of 2004 finds Rose City Yacht Club in excellent financial shape. We

club is requiring its members to have their insurance companies forward their proof of insurance. If we burn a boat or two we will not be dumping thousands of gallons of diesel in the water. It will, however, cost almost as much to clean up a little spill as it does to clean up a big one. Do we want to rely on ourselves to clean up any fuel spills? I'm told that is an option. Do we want members with a boat in the moorage to name RCYC as an additional named insured? It will protect the club but it is possible that this can turn around and bite you. Should the Club buy a policy to cover everybody for fuel spills? This type of insurance is currently not included in the Club's insurance package. We are seeking quotes from several sources for this type of insurance. The cost could be in the thousands of dollars.

We are currently in the process of changing the Moorage Rules. First the electrical cord leading to your boat will now be a marine grade cord. The orange extension cord will no longer be acceptable. Next the insurance coverage will be tightened. In addition to liability insurance, we will require fuel and other spill coverage and wreck removal. The responsibility for seeing that this requirement is met will be that of the Board. These changes will be published in the next issue of the Year Book.

Membership change – Larry McCagg petitioned the board for a membership change to inactive status. It seems he sold Takaroa.
