# COMMODORE'S LOG

Congratulations to one and all. At this time I can tell you that there are no uninsured boats in the moorage. Everybody who was a little slow in getting their insurance policies up to date have gotten it done. We are now a 100% insured Club. Don't forget when your policy renews, the moorage rules require you to send a copy of the declaration page to the Vice Commodore.

Mike and Delphi Godsil asked and were reluctantly granted a membership status change from Active to Inactive effective September 1st.

We are on budget for the dredge. The dredge season starts in October and it is reassuring to know that there is money in the kitty for dredging. In prior years it has been sort of hand to mouth. We have spent a lot of money on rebuilding and modernizing the machinery and it looks like it is paying off. Our thanks go to those few farsighted members who envisioned rebuilding the dredge in lieu of replacing it. The rebuild started with a new power plant, converting the controls from mechanical to hydraulic, and numerous safety improvements were added. Our thanks go to everybody in the crew for keeping the costs down, especially Bob Fellman and Pete Unger.

The Long Range Planning Committee reported, "We have money". All kidding aside, what this means is that Walk 5 replacement is back on the table for the foreseeable future. More data needs to be obtained; however, it could be replaced as early as 2006. My concern is whether we want to increase our debt or pay cash. Perhaps

someplace in-between is better. Loren Beach is ordering four more T-Slips for fall delivery, and the shower, storage, and shop float is out for bid.

We can't do much about the bird droppings on the docks, but we can surely do something about our dogs. We can keep them under control, properly leashed and out of the clubhouse.



## MOORAGE MATTERS:

A number of members have notified me that they have sold their boats. Some are holding on to their slip while they make up their mind what to buy next and some have already succumbed to "two foot-itis." It does appear that another boat on the waiting list will get a slip this month.

We still need a 35 or 36 foot boat from Walk I to offer to move over to slip 27 on Walk 2; this will allow another member's 38 footer to come into the moorage. Thank you.

Your Board just voted unanimously to purchase four more concrete slips for fall delivery. It is likely that the installation will take place at a special work party sometime in September.

A few of you still do not have current Oregon tags. With increasing sheriff and USCG presence on the river this simmer, you need to "get legal" to avoid an expensive ticket.

Clanging halyards: Complaints are increasing -- to the point of threats of duct taping them to the mast. Even if you do not care about the chafing on your own mast, please tie them off to a pulpit or toe rail so that they will not disturb the neighbors and residents.

Security: A member locked the gate open recently, inadvertently allowing a thief to enter and try to break into a member's car. This week some tourists walked in (actually sneaked in) during a gate opening for a member car. They were asked to leave and they did. If you see activity like this, talk to them. If they refuse to leave or get belligerent, call the Sheriff. Our gate and all fenced sections do have new "no trespassing" signs.

# Vice's Vagaries

The following information is to answer a number of questions raised by members regarding the handling of the declarations pages they submit to the Board as required by the moorage rules. First, the declarations pages are not being stored at the club or available for "public" information. The pages are currently in a secured file at our residence while records are being set up. Secondly, data (member name, boat, slip number, insurance company, policy number, renewal date, whether the policy includes spill liability, and whether declarations page has been received) is summarized into a spreadsheet for use by the Board. Thirdly, when the renewal copy of the declarations page is received, the old one is shredded. Given this day and age, we shred everything that has any identifying information on it. The information can be submitted by snail mail to either the club or my home address, via fax to 503/652-1549 or scanned and e-mailed to me (mikeox@qwest.net). As renewals become due, members are receiving a letter advising them of the changes in moorage rules and requesting submission of the declarations page.

The books closed on spring work hours on June 15. A final report was sent to Wes Davis for third quarter billings. A total of 12 people will be billed either fully or partially for unperformed work hours. A total of 4,800 hours were worked this spring. Of this, 2,300 were on the clubhouse remodel and 747 were from work parties. A lot of hard work was accomplished by many hands!!

Now that we've worked hard, it's time to think about playing. Are you interested in an Alaskan cruise on a Holland America ship in early June 2005? This is considered the "off season" so rates are lower than at high summer. How about such a cruise at a group rate and where you have no obligation to any "group" activities? We started out putting together a family and friends cruise and it mushroomed. 

## Lazy Days Cruise -Lewis and Clark/Corps of Discovery Bicentennial

Want to follow the Corps of Discovery on your Lazy Days Cruise? Many who attended the June meeting expressed their appreciation of the presentation by Pete Field of the Federal Highway Administration. Pete talked about Astoria area events linked to the Lewis and Clark/Corps of Discovery Bicentennial. He referred us to several websites for more information about historic Fort Clatsop, the Explorer Bus, the Lewis and Clark Train, and a Washington Map with notes on the Corps' stops along the river. Here are those web sites:

### 1. http://www.nps.gov/focl/index.htm

The Fort Clatsop web site of the National Park Service has information about this National Memorial, Lewis and Clark facts, and Bicentennial events. A link on the left side of the page takes you to the Explorer shuttle service, which connects the area's communities to the historic sites and events. Another link lists details on the Fort's summer hours. Tickets to the Fort are "timed entry", so you will need to make sure to arrive in plenty of time to make your reservation.

### 2. http://www.ridethebus.org

Even if you don't make it to Fort Clatsop, your \$5 three-day pass provides access to transit throughout Astoria and to neighboring communities of Warrenton, Ilwaco, and even Seaside. Tickets are also good for the trolley, which now runs all the way to the NEW Safeway store near the East Mooring Basin – just in case you need to re-provision while in Astoria. The Explorer link from the NPS site takes you to the transit schedules or you can take the above link to a more comprehensive map and time schedule.

### 3. <a href="http://www.wsdot.wa.gov/communications/Map/">http://www.wsdot.wa.gov/communications/Map/</a> LewisClark.htm

Washington State DOT commemorates the Corps of Discovery on their most recent highway map. From this site you can download just the parts of the map you need or order your own copy. The map is notated with the dates the Corps stopped at various points along the river. The map also includes photos or related quotes from the journals for each stop, and these are duplicated on the web site.

### 4. www.amtrak.com

If you're not going to Astoria by boat, you may want to get there by train. Amtrak has instituted train service between Portland and Astoria every Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, through September 20, 2004. Tickets will be available through Amtrak's web site, above, or by calling 1-800-USA-RAIL.
