Vice Commodore's Report

Now that the dust has settled and funds are available to keep the wolf away from the treasury door, it's time to solve some of the pending problems. There are a few things to keep our Commodore busy, such as the replacement of the entry gate, refurbishing of the galley, redoing of the parking lot, and the primary set up for the replacement of Walk 5.

During the discussion about raising fees, one of the comments made was about inequity of moorage fees. We said that this issue would be addressed after the increase was done. Now that we know our total needs, we can now try to distribute them equitably. The Commodore will appoint a panel to make recommendations to the Board. The Board will review the proposals and make recommendations to the membership. Then the membership would discuses and vote on the proposed changes. This way everybody would have the opportunity to make his/her views known. Jim Himes began a survey, but more work must be done to get a good picture.

Our entry gate is in need a lot of work. The heavy trucks have broken down the asphalt apron, and it is just a matter of time until the gate will no longer open from the inside. Also, for security, the gate needs to be a little taller and the opening key box must be fixed. The gate also needs safety devices to bring it into compliance with current codes.

Our galley needs some work to complete the remodel of the Clubhouse that Larry Corderman had almost finished. We need new drop-in ranges (3) and new counter-tops, as well as adjusting one area of the cabinets to allow for the new rack.

Then there is the replacement of Walk 5. We must start now to lay the ground

work to begin replacement (pilings) in the winter of 2008.

DRY MOORAGE

The RCYC Board has approved a proposal to provide dry moorage for Club members at the west end of the parking lot. The goal of the proposal is to provide space for small boats, dinghys, small race boats and junior sailboats, as well as a need to better organize the area. This space will be limited to boats/ trailers that are actively used at the Club.

The Board appointed Directors Dave Hickman and Herm Fischer as Dry Moorage Co-Chairs. Any boat/trailer owner currently in this area or wishing to store in this area must contact Dave or Herm for approval to use this area.

The current Dry Moorage standards are as follows

- I. The owner of each trailer/boat must have an identifying sign placed on the trailer or written on the tongue.
- 2. The owner is responsible for maintaining the grass under and around their trailer.
- 3. All dry moorage spaces are to be assigned by the Dry Moorage Chair.
- 4. All boats and trailers must meet state registration laws. (Boats and trailers less than 1800 lbs. do not have to be registered in Oregon.) All boats stored in the dry moorage area are required to have insurance as required by RCYC.
- 5. Temporary trailer/boat storage for less than one week will have not charge, but must meet all other requirements.
- 6. There is a limited number of spaces available. Each space will be assigned by the Dry Moorage Chair on a first come first served basis. Each space will be billed in advance, quarterly at \$25.00 per month.

NOTE: Any trailer that is currently in the dry moorage area must be identified to the Dry Moorage Chair as soon as possible.

Clean Marina Program

As part of the Clean Marina Program, the Board approved the following addition to the Moorage Rules.

5. Oregon Clean Marina Guidelines

RCYC complies with Oregon Clean Marina Program. The following additional moorage rules (many of which are legally required) can improve water quality in the moorage and the appearance of our Club.

- a. Boat Maintenance. RCYC does not have an "upland" boat maintenance facility. The following shall apply to maintenance in the water. The intent of these rules is to limit and reduce activities that produce debris that might enter the waterway.
 - (1) When scraping or sanding paint on a boat, attempt to do so on less windy days and provide a means to prevent paint chips from entering the water. Dustless sanders are recommended. Spray painting is prohibited except below decks or inside boathouses. HVLP or HELP spray systems are recommended.
 - (2) In water hull scraping or processes that occur underwater which remove paint from the boat hull is prohibited. Note: This is not intended to prohibit the cleaning of the hull underwater to eliminate marine growth.
 - (3 It is RCYC policy to comply with both Federal and State regulations regarding the discharge of treated or untreated human waste. RCYC boats with MSD's or holding tanks are advised to utilize pumpout stations.
 - (4) Discharge of antifreeze (ethlylene glycol) into the water is prohibited. Members are encouraged to collect and recycle used antifreeze.
 - (5) Oil recycling is provided in the upland storage tank. Addition of anything besides used oil to the tank (such as antifreeze, gasoline, solvents, paints, varnishes, or pesticides) is strictly prohibited, as this results in the entire tank being classified as hazardous waste and adds a large expense to the club.
 - (6) Open burning of petroleum-containing waste, plastics, garbage and materials that generate black smoke or noxious fumes is prohibited.
 - (7) Disposal of fish wastes in the moorage basin is prohibited. Fish waste should be disposed of in the trash containers on shore.
 - (8) The use of less toxic cleaners (e.g., Simple Green, etc.) in the clubhouse is recommended.
- b. Members are advised that an emergency response plan is posted in the clubhouse. Notification procedures and telephone contact numbers are included in this plan.

Racing @ RCYC

Local News: Is your crew ready? Is your boat prepared to race? It may seem early, but the first race of the 2007 Portland season is just around the corner. The RCYC Frostbite is scheduled for Saturday, March 31 at 1100 hours and will again be the first Portland race of the year. This annual race event follows on the heels of the SYSCO Race Clinic to be held at the RCYC Clubhouse on Thursday, March 29 at 1830 hours and on-the-water Friday, March 30 at 1800 hours. If you are new to racing or interested in participating at any level this season, you should plan on attending this informative event. It is open to everyone and will cover starting sequences, rules, and local knowledge, as well as other topics. At the very least, the "on-the-water" session Friday night is a great opportunity for crew practice and a rig tune-up in anticipation of the Frostbite on Saturday. As in the past, we will attempt to start several races on Saturday before heading to the Sextant for the social and trophy presentation. One-design, level, PHRF & No-Fly-Sail classes are all welcome and encouraged to participate. Please contact your Race Captains with any questions and don't forget to register your intention to race.

So, what about those of you not up for racing? Well we have a great opportunity for you too! Join your race captains and help out with the race management. Kim and I could certainly use a little help on the water and at the post race socials. We especially need a finish line boat again this year for the Frostbite & Summer Regattas, but we can always use an extra set of eyes taking finish times. A big thanks to all those who have helped us out over the past 2 years, but how about a few more members stepping up and helping out for a day or two or volunteering their boat for a day? You don't have to be a racer, former racer, or even know anything about sailboat racing, and you will get one of the best seats in the house for all of the action.

Racing News: Following Duwamish Head, we brought *Gladiator* back to Portland to replace the standing rigging; with two broken strands, we decided that the boat was trying to tell us something. So with some new wires that fit perfectly (thank you Schooner Creek!)



it was up I-5 and into the water in Olympia. With a little tuning and practice, we were ready to sail the Toliva Shoals Race. Class breaks were announced Friday night, and we were disappointed to see that our fleet had shrunk to two boats: **Gladiator** and the Olson 25, **Frolic**. That's okay, we just want to sail, and like the last two races, we are out there to sail against the other 80+ boats for overall anyway.

Saturday morning 17 February dawned, and Olympia was shrouded in fog. An on time start was looking doubtful. As we motored out to the starting area the fog was burning off, the sun was poking out, and the wind began building from the end of Budd Inlet for a downwind start. Each fleet got off their start on time, and our turn came up at 1020. But a look down the course, and every boat starting in front of us was sitting in a huge windless parking lot. It took only minutes for us to run down the "big boats" that started 20 minutes in front of us and to run out of wind just like them. We quickly dropped the chute and set the jib loosely and managed to work our way through and over most of the other fleets by aggressively roll tacking from tiny puff to tiny puff. Each one was enough to get us going, but the "big boats" were stuck in peanut butter.

By the time the wind filled in we found ourselves ahead of *Frolic* and about 3/4 of the other boats in the race. The wind filled from the west; it was still light, but at least it was somewhat consistent. We started to make our way past Boston Harbor, trading tacks with many of the "big boats" that were finally starting to move in the building breeze. As we approached Doffelmeyer Point the wind began to bend north and became quite spotty. We started to play "connect the dots" with the puffs to keep rolling down the course, but soon found ourselves in a big hole in the middle of Dana Passage with a flood tide; not very smart on our part. We managed to work our way to the shallows for some tide relief, but *Frolic* rolled over us on the opposite side of the course, while we were going backwards, and headed off to Johnston Point. Fortunate for us, *Frolic* soon parked in a hole as well. What a strange race; it was sunny, warm, windless and time for some lunch. As we looked around there were only about 15 boats in front of us; the other 60 or so were well behind and going nowhere, but wait, what

is that behind us? The predicted southerly was filling in and chutes were starting to pop out behind us. We were all alone until the wind started to bring a pack of J-35s, Express 37s and Shock 35s down to us under spinnaker. A new race was on in a 15 knot southerly!

Our limp spinnaker filled and we were off to chase down *Frolic*. We were posting nice speed running with 35 footers, but there was clearly another hole in front of us. A number of boats compressed again at Johnston Point for a few seconds as the southerly turned east and built into the high teens for a jib reach down to Lyle Point. We were fortunate to hook up on the stern wake of a passing J-35 that pulled us down the course at over 8 knots for 30 or 40 minutes; *Frolic* was not so lucky. As we rounded Lyle Point and went back to spinnaker, *Frolic* was a distant memory.

As we headed off to Ketron Island some of the "big boats" began to pass us; it was just about time! We soon gybed and started to head for Toliva Shoal. The wind continued to build into the low twenties, the waves began to build and soon we found ourselves back under headsail close reaching for the halfway mark. We started to plan our rounding strategy and return through Balch Passage as the tide was beginning to turn to an ebb, but then we noticed boats under main alone returning to Olympia and realized that the Race Committee was ending the race at Toliva Shoal. This was great news for *Gladiator*; no upwind leg in sloppy seas and all of the leaders within sight at the finish. We shot through the finish at the shoal, collected the gun and kept on sailing for Gig Harbor.

It was a strange day of wind, no wind, not enough wind and almost to much wind, and it was fun, no it was frustrating, still fun, still

frustrating, wait, it was fun. We knew that we saved our time on *Frolic* and took first in our division and we knew that we did well overall as we decompressed and sailed under the Tacoma Narrows Bridge looking back on 50+ boats that had not yet finished. It wasn't until the results were posted that we learned that we also bagged first overall out of all fleets for the day. It was a great day of racing with a little luck and some good results.
