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## Moorage Matters

Checking your moorage lines for wear and chafe is always a good idea. Lots of wakes rolled through our little moorage this summer, and in late September a half-inch stern line snapped on a Walk 2 boat.

Please keep the walkways clear -- if your bow sprit overhangs the walk itself, move your boat back and re-tie the lines. Members can be hurt by anchors and bow sprits at face level, especially in the darker winter months. If the end of your boat is still really close along the edge of the walk, put some caution tape or a white flag on that anchor.

Cleaning Alert: Walk I (and other walks after they are sealed) should NOT be pressure washed. It cost around \$1,000 to seal Walk I, and Bellingham Marine (builders) warned against pressure washing. Just regular hose spray and a scrub brush is okay.

If you remove your dinghy from any of the "dinghy docks" for the winter, be sure to put a readable name plate on your spot. An empty spot without a name can be claimed by anyone.

Note that soon we will be draining and forcefully airing out all the water lines on all the walks. This is normally done at the last work party. After that, NO ONE is to turn on those supply lines until spring. (We do, however, try to maintain electron pressure in the power outlets.)

Dredging season will start on November 1st, and; as you know, without removing sand yearly, we would soon be unable to moor boats here. If you want to work on any part of the dredge program, from weekend pipe-laying to being a helper or learning to be an operator, contact Fred Whitfield, our Dredge Chair.

Until we dredge, and until winter rains bring higher water, some fin keel boats may have difficulty leaving or entering fairways whenever the river level gauge reads one foot and down to zero. You may want to check the NOAA web site for current levels in Portland before going boating. Here is the URL for the nearby Vancouver river gauge: http://ahps2.wrh.noaa.gov/ahps2/hydrograph.php?wfo=pqr&qage=vanw1.

A special "Thank You" goes to Bob Fellman and Pete Unger for their hours of work in preparing both our work boats for the upcoming busy season. Also, a tip of the hard hat to Norm Gustafson and Doug Hepburn for some machinery rebuilding on our dredge.

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# Tommy Green

Tommy Green had a life-long association with Rose City Yacht Club. Our parents, Tom and Connie Green joined RCYC in 1948 when Tommy was five. He and our late sister, Tamara, grew up with some of our current members: Lynn Easton, John Kneeland, Bob Laird, Ron Moran, and Trine Page.

He raced with some of you, too: Werner and Renate Bittner, Jeff Crass, Joby Easton, Don Eudaly, Smoke and Patti Fischer, Mike Godsil, Jim Hackley, Cork Inman, Jim and Alverna Martin, Larry Roberts, Pam Sesar, and with past members Jack and Linda Armes, Denny and Wilma Snyder, and Mike and Cheri Eudaly, along with many others.

Many more of you know him for his fiberglass work, which he learned by working with our Dad and Wade Cornwell at Yacht Constructors, and which became a lifelong pursuit. He and Tom Becker kept occupied with talk of techniques and methods for many long evenings on RCYC cruises.

For a short time, Tommy owned a J-24 and was a member of RCYC, 1968-75. During that period his boat sat in his driveway awaiting needed repairs, while he worked on it between money-making jobs. At last he sold it, admitting that he was content to crew with others or race their boats for them. (For many years he skippered Jack Gainer's Rain Drop on Saturdays when Jack had to work.)

In 1992, when our Dad was facing failing health, he took my brother and me in as partners on the Cascade 36 that he'd built and launched in 1975. Tommy and Sally joined RCYC again, using Tamara for several years, and were a regular part of the Lazy Days week. The four of us — Tommy and Sally, Dad and I — would take the boat on all the other club cruises. Sometimes with other family and friends along, we had as many as seven people staying aboard. In recent years, Tommy turned toward other pursuits, and sold his interest in Tamara to Dave and me. By that time he and Sally were taking



weekend trips aboard T.C. Whiskers, touring streams and sloughs along the Columbia and Willamette rivers and the Oregon/Washington coast.

On behalf of Sally Green and our family, I'd like to thank those of you who sent cards and flowers and who offered prayers and kind thoughts at my brother's passing. He was a very special person, who will be missed by his many friends at RCYC and on the river. I know I will miss his grin, his laugh, his love, and his stories of the river back in the "old days."

### Dredging News Fred Whitfield, Dredge Chair

It's time to begin thinking about one of our favorite fall activities -- dredging. Once again we'll need volunteers to be on dredge crews. I'll be in touch with those who volunteered last year, but if you are new to the club or just feel that the time is right to become part of this elite group (and earn your "Bottoms Up" tee shirt), give me a call or send me an e-mail and I'll get you on the list.

We will once again plan to begin dredging in early November. I'm still working out what areas need dredging. If you have any problem with depth in your slip or know of any shallow spots in the fairways, let me know.

We have a new need this year. The club has purchased a new portable turbidimeter. Two questions immediately arise -- how the heck do you pronounce it and what does it do? What

it does is measure the turbidity (clarity) of a sample of water. We will need to take samples of river water while dredging, and record the results of turbidity measurements for incorporating into a report to DEQ. The only critical things involved are handling the equipment, and making sure samples are properly collected. The time involved is only a few

minutes per sample. Just think, you could be a lab technician! What I'd like to see is a few volunteers who would form a team to make sure samples are collected and recorded daily as required during dredging. It would be a great job for someone who is frequently at the club and could take a couple minutes out for this. Please let me know if you are interested.

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# Racing @ RCYC

The last RCYC race of 2007 is now in the books, and our tenure as the RCYC Race Captains has also come to an end. The Harry Brault Memorial Long Distance Race was our final event. The race entries started to come in slowly, but a weekend of great weather began to speed the process. By race day we had over thirty boats entered in the event, many coming from RCYC. It was a bit of a nail biter on Friday as we picked up firewood and beer, and prepared the club launch for the event. The prediction was for 0 - 4 knots of wind nearly all day Saturday and until late evening on Sunday. This simply would not make for an enjoyable weekend. The best we could hope for was a great party at Sand Island. With that in mind it was back to Rogue Brewing for a second keg of beer.

Saturday dawned with a heavy overcast and unusually cool temperatures, but a nice 5 – 8 knot breeze. As I motored down river I was praying that the wind would hold out until the I I 30 start, and hold out it did. Once anchored off of Day Mark "39" it was time to greet the racers as they came by for the Sailing Instructions and Class Breaks. Then right on schedule at I I 35, the race was off in a near perfect breeze. David Paligo's Merit 25 "Runaway" nailed the start and took an early lead, but soon the Sportboats ground them down and began to run off in the light stuff.

The fleet remained somewhat compressed, but began to separate into smaller groups of closely matched boats as they proceeded down river toward the turning mark at the end of Sand Island. I pulled anchor and ran down to take some photos before heading to St. Helens to meet Kim and ferry our personal gear over to Sand Island for the night. Within the first couple of miles some definite match-ups began to develop. First was the match race in the Sport Boat Division between Arden Newbrook's Mumm 30 "Mummbo Jummbo" and the Flying Tiger 10 "Tiger Lilly" of Mark McCuddy. Even though these boats are different, they are rated the same and they definitely showed that they were evenly matched in these conditions by trading tacks most of the way to St Helens. The next pairing on the course was between the two C&C 44's, "Tango" and "Fury", owned by Charlie MacDonald and

Fred Hazzard, respectively. These boats also traded tacks and jibes all the way to the finish to be separated by only 15 seconds in the end. Following closely behind the "Furniture" 44s" were the NY 36's, "Wave Dancer" of Steve & Melissa Moshofsky and Jeff Crass' "Amaretto" that also ended up match racing to the finish. Then like pesky mosquitoes that the NY 36s couldn't seem to shake came "Apple Pi", the Martin 242 of Rock & Dena Kent and "Skookum Too", the Martin 241 of George Brown. Following these match-ups was the parade of boats fighting for position and overall honors. I quickly lost track of who had passed by in my rush to get pictures of each boat. Soon enough the last boat in the fleet sailed by and it was time to beat feet to Sand Island, off load the club launch, pick-up Kim at the St Helens fuel dock and prepare for the boats to finish. I made it to Sand Island, off loaded the gear and looked up to see the two Sportboats sailing past Warrior Rock. Seemingly record time for the trip down river, there wasn't going to be any time to pick up Kim before boats were finishing. Sure enough, the parade began to round the mark and head back up river to the finish at Sand Island much earlier than we had predicted.

The first around the turning mark were "Mummbo Jummbo" and "Tiger Lilly" who dueled to the end and finished just before 1400 with the narrow victory going to "Mummbo Jummbo". The C&C 44s, then the NY 36s and the Martins all in their own tight match races followed them shortly. Boats were finishing and arriving at the dock (and keg), but Kim was at the fuel dock with the beer cups! Once that was realized, it didn't take much convincing to get Steve and crew on "Wave Dancer" to make a guick stop and get the beer cups (and Kim!) before mooring for the night; thanks again guys. The remainder of the fleet came through the finish and joined the growing armada at the Sand Island dock. The last boat to finish was tied up before 1630. What a guick trip it was for the entire fleet, and what a great party with everyone on the dock and around the fire.

There is no report for the race home on Sunday as the weather prediction was spot on with nothing for wind at start time building to a little more than no wind as we slowly moved up river towards home. I really would have liked to get a race off, but the light and inconsistent wind would not have provided for a fair competition. Final results are from Saturday's racing and can be found at:
