I look back with pleasure and a sense of satisfaction for having accomplished so many of our goals for 2007. We have continued to make improvements on our facilities: A galley remodel is nearly completed, additional concrete fingers have been installed, and we have begun to finalize plans for the first improvements to Walk 5. We are also nearly a year into a dry storage plan in the parking lot and will be evaluating its success and continuation in the coming months.

Our goal to provide educational opportunities for our members led to several safety and maintenance topics this spring, and an emphasis on Vessel Safety Checks. We also helped a number of members get their Oregon Boater's Education card through a three-week class at the Clubhouse. During this year, we have become certified as a Clean Marina, and have recognized our 75th Anniversary with a special logo, Anniversary-themed decorations on Opening Day, and new items in our Ship's Store.

Early this year we took a major step toward long-term financial stability, and we will be putting the extra funds being collected from members to good use as we begin next year's push to replace Walk 5. In a separate effort, we appointed a group to collect input from our members to begin evaluating our moorage rates,

and they will be presenting their findings next spring.

Along the way I hope that you have found the Board has been willing to listen to your concerns and that we have involved members as much as possible as we plan for the Club's future. Although we had to table one goal-related item

Moorage Matters

Winter weather is coming. I hope that you have removed your roller-furled headsails from the boat or secured them with extra ties. Same for mains, although the shredding risk is lower. Remember that natural ventilation is the best way to keep the interior dry, and that running a heater on board will not save an un-winterized engine when a week of 20 degree weather with 30 knot winds is matched all-too-often by a three-day power outage. Power cords must be 30-amp marine, per the Moorage Rules, with sealed ends, and must not hang down into the water. A strain relief tie-off must be used at the power post on the dock.

Oregon Registration Information: Postcard notices seem to have arrived in mailboxes in mid-November for all those with two-year stickers expiring at the end of 2007. I renewed mine on-line, and the new stickers arrived in the mail about a week later. It was just that easy. Washington state-registered boats with '07 stickers need to contact their state for the correct procedure to follow. Do not put this off until next year.

Walk 4: By early December I plan to have the remaining finger docks repositioned on this Walk. Everyone south of Bittners' slip will be in different water, but most will be somewhere near where they have been. Starboard tie requests have been taken into account. All the slips will be wider, too. We have relocated the Port Captain's residence, one private dock, six finger docks, and eliminated all the four-way ties. Thanks to the last regular work party for all the preparation they did for these moves, plus the special work party that moved the residence. Special thanks goes to Dave Kibby for both his knowledge and his long hours of work in the rain on two days to square away the wiring and conduit.

Dredging is happening and sand is flowing up into the settling pond. As in the past, when you are down at the Club during dredge operations, be sure to look at the gauge board and then walk out to where the dredge is operating and hold up fingers to indicate the actual river level. (The tide can often raise or lower the water level a foot an hour, and might catch the crew off guard.) Wave at them and smile. It can be lonely work on a rainy day. Hint: chocolate chip cookies are always appreciated.

Be sure to check fenders, mooring lines, and snubbers!



Dredging News Fred Whitfield, Dredge Chair

Dredging is Under Way. This year's dredging got off to a good start on November 3, with a work party setting up the dredge, connecting the pipe and cables, and getting everything operational. We started by taking the hump out of the Walk I fairway, plus cleaning out a couple of slips. After a few days we moved to Walk 4 to clean out the area formerly under Lynn and Connie's house after it was shifted shoreward. As of this writing, we are moving toward the River on Walk 4 and expect to have that fairway finished in the next few days. Things are going great and proceeding on schedule. A big thanks so far to all the people who have helped out. Dredging requires over 400 work hours per month. It's no small operation, and goes on seven days per week.

A new job this year is taking turbidity readings to monitor what we do to the River as a result of our dredging activity. We have several folks who got acquainted with the Club's new turbidimeter and

have become the "sampling crew". This device looks at a water sample and tells us how "muddy" the water is. We take water samples about half way between the surface and the river bottom in the

moorage, and then analyze it using the meter. We record the results for later reporting to DEQ. We are particularly watchful as to whether our pond outfall has any real effect on the river. To gage this, samples are taken daily near

the outfall, but in water unaffected by it, and compared with samples taken 300 feet downstream of the outfall. Turbidity can be as little as 0 and as high as several hundred units. Drinking water is in the 0 to 5 unit range. At the start of dredging the River was low and clear, reading 2 to 3 units. We are finding that water coming from our outfall seldom raises the turbidity more than 1 unit at 300 feet downstream. We think that's a pretty clean operation!

So far we have over 30 members who have volunteered for dredging crews. Not all have been on the job yet, but we'll work in everyone we can during December. After completing the fairway on Walk 4, we'll move to the fairway on Walk 3, and finally to Walk 5 where a couple of humps await our attention. If your boat is on one of these Walks, keep an eye on our progress, as you may be temporarily unable to get your boat out easily. *Thanks for the help!*
