Thanks to Jeff Crass, we purchased a new 90 HP Mercury outboard for \$7482 installed, a very good deal. There is also a problem with the boat's fuel tank that Tom Becker has agreed to fix. Moorage Matters

Wait List: There has been no movement on the moorage waiting list, and two more members have now been added.

Dinghies: All but a few now have a name plate. A name plate does not have be expensive or fancy, just UV and water proof. Since those little boats are some of the first sights to greet visitors to our Club, please give that dinghy a scrubbrush bath once a season.

The present plan is for the September work parties to build two new dinghy docks, which will give us more room for tenders as well as some dedicated racks for kayaks. This project will end the present cycle of upgrades for this portion of the moorage plan.

Sidebar: If we do not get them removed any sooner, the owners of dinghies on the present east dock (the old piece of wood headwalk) should remove their little boats ASAP, storing them temporarily – in any vacant spot along the ice wall on Walk I or in one of the few open slots on other docks – until the new dock is built. The fall work parties need to see a big turn out to accomplish this as well as the long list of Club maintenance and upkeep items as we start to prepare for the rainy season.

Slip Name Plates: Ron Moran is about to machine some new ones. He and I will soon walk the moorage to compile a list of slips with missing or broken plates.

Dredging Preparations: Further prep work on our settling pond is about to start as the Club prepares for the winter dredging season. Thanks to members who have cleaned the brush from the north side berm of the pond, we'll have easier access during dredging, when we go to that area constantly to check the outfall and to add boards to the weir.

Work and Utility Boats: If you use either boat, be SURE that you correctly lock it up with the heavy chain and lock through the steel tab, or around the pipe on the steel boat. If the fuel tank is low, tell me or any officer. Leave the inside of the boat cleaner than you found it, and coil all lines and put tools away in the Shop. If working alone on the water, do wear a life jacket.

Security: The ramp gate and all doors to the Clubhouse must be locked at dusk. If you access the Clubhouse later, you must turn off all lights and lock up completely.

Have fun and be safe when around the water.

Proper Oil Recycling

On the evening of the June General Meeting, several members noticed jugs of used oil lying next to the garbage dumpster. Our garbage hauler does not handle recycled oil and will leave the jugs where they lie.

Oil recycling is covered in paragraph A.5.5 in our Moorage Rules. Our oil recycling tank is located in the small shed next to the Chapel storage building in the SW corner of our parking lot. Full jugs are to be left inside the shed. Our Oil Czar, Hans Geerling, will empty them into the tank. Leave only used motor oil. Jugs containing anything else (e.g. antifreeze, gasoline, etc.) could cause the entire tankload to be rejected for recycling, forcing RCYC to spend an immense sum for hazardous waste disposal. We can't afford that.

Leaving jugs by the dumpster will just make more work for another member. Please contact Hans with any oilrecycling questions.



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Sail for the Cure

Sail for the Cure will visit RCYC at our July 15th meeting.

The Oregon Women's Sailing Association has selected September 27 for the 10th Annual Sail for the Cure. The 2009 theme is "Our cup runneth over," and it certainly does. In the last nine years, OWSA has raised close to \$200,000 for the Oregon and SW Washington Women for the Cure ®affiliate, 75% of which stays right here, with the rest going to research. The day includes a familyfriendly Columbia River sail, a party and auction at the Portland Yacht Club, as well as pre-event fundraising activities throughout the Portland area. During the sailing portion of Sail for the Cure, boat owners take out participants in 18 to 54 foot sailboats for on-the water games which emphasize boathandling and cooperation. Last year, 70 boat owners took out 450 sailors. This year, organizers hope to increase those numbers. Most participants find the event to be worthwhile beyond the funds they help raise. Charlie McDonald, Tango skipper and two time participant, says he and his family enjoy Sail for the Cure because it's a day spent sailing. More than that, said McDonald, seeing the joy expressed on his crew's face when the motor shuts off, is its own reward. "The first year we had one 'crew' that had been quite depressed.....when she took over the helm 'with some guidance' her entire outlook changed. Her partner

said it was her best day in a long time. [It was] also one of our best." Beyond the September 27th events, there are other ways to help OWSA eradicate breast cancer, which affects more women and men in the Pacific Northwest than anywhere in the United States. Thursday, July 16th, West Marine, located at 1176 Hayden Meadows Dr., will donate 5% of that day's purchases to Sail for the Cure. What could be more painless? Other

local business give back to the community by donating goods and services for the auction, or by sponsoring the event. In addition, plans are underway to have a local Columbia River eatery raffle a pink kayak. And again this year, through "Make the Kindest Cut" Sail for the Cure will be collecting un-color-treated hair, at least 8 inches in length, to have free wigs made for cancer patients. Last year, the group gathered 28 pony tails, enough hair for more than 4 wigs. An important part of Sail for the Cure is the pledge drive. To highlight the event's 10th anniversary, organizers are asking for \$10 pledges, and requesting that pledgers invite 10 friends to pledge \$10, and so on. According

to Sail for the Cure Chairperson, Jeanine Hahn, "If all 500 participants find just 10 others to pledge \$10, we could raise \$50,000 in pledges alone." Around the Club

Rentals, a reminder: In the 2009 Yearbook, on pages 71 and 72, is the "RCYC Clubhouse Use Policy." All members who are considering rental of the Clubhouse for an event should be aware of and follow the policy. Remember, to reserve the Clubhouse for an event, you need to contact the Vice Commodore directly. Once it is confirmed the Clubhouse is available on the date requested, you will need to complete and submit a Clubhouse reservation agreement with the appropriate user fee and separate deposit check.

The Clubhouse rental agreement can be downloaded directly from the Board's website (http://www.rosecityyachtclub.org/). The payment along with the completed reservation form is to be sent directly to Balance Your World Bookkeeping; and a copy of the rental agreement, directly to the Vice Commodore.

Work Hours Report: Nearly 1900 work hours were posted for the first half of the year. The count is slightly distorted, because committee chairs' work hours for the year are posted in the first half of the year, but the figures are close enough for – well – yacht club work. While many members contributed more than the minimum number of work hours, special thanks go to Mick Salituro, Chuck Stuckey and Judy Oxborrow

Launch News: The rehabilitation of the Club launch is proceeding, albeit slowly. In an effort to ensure that the Club has a safe and fully operational Club launch to support Club racing and cruising programs, members are working to identify what needs to be done to the launch and how to do it. Equally important is the question of how to maintain it in Bristol condition. The launch is RCYC's "billboard on the river".

Many members have worked on the rehab project or committed to the effort. To date, they include but are not limited to Bill Wright, Bob Gales, Eric Rimkus, Jeff Crass, Tom Becker and Anita Fallon. All good things take time. With time, RCYC should have a safe, fully operational, and well maintained launch to support Club functions.

Let's talk about where your valuable and important member talents can be put to good use.

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RCYC DRY MOORAGE REGULATIONS

Board of Directors

PREAMBLE: After an advisory vote of the general membership, the Board of Directors has approved a dry moorage area in the northwest corner of the parking lot. The area is designed primarily for club members who, from time to time, use their vessels in other venues. It is not a storage area for unused vessels and/or trailers. The area is geographically limited and, as currently configured, will accommodate only seven spaces, or slips. The area will be administered under the following policies and regulations.

Dry Moorage Chair: The Board will select a member to act as chair. This member will administer the area, insure that the regulations are followed, and may from time to time propose changes to these regulations as experience may suggest. The chair has the authority to change slip assignments among the users to maximize the use of the area.

Waiting List: After all slips have been assigned, the chair will create and administer a waiting list and fill vacancies from the list on a first-come, first-served basis.

Fee: Each slip user will be charged _____ *per month. This fee will be charged to the members quarterly account. The Board will review the fee annually and may adjust it as it deems appropriate.

Sub-let: Each member user of the dry moorage shall responsible for the applicable fee during periods in which the vessel and/ or trailer are absent from dry moorage. In a manner similar to the RCYC wet moorage, a temporary absence may create an opportunity for another member to use the slip for the duration of the absence. Such arrangements shall be mutually arranged with the slip user and the chair.

No Storage: The area is for active use only. Any vessel and/or trailer unused for 12 months will be required to vacate the slip. Registration: Any vessel and/or trailer must be in compliance with all state and local laws and registration requirements. Only vessels and/or trailers owned by and registered to RCYC members will be allowed in the dry moorage.

No Work: No repair, maintenance, washing of vessel and/or trailer or work of any kind shall be performed in the dry moorage. With prior approval of the chair, a user may conduct a very limited repair only if the work does not impact others in the area.

Related Equipment: Only equipment related to the use of the vessel and/or trailer may be stored in the dry moorage. All such stored equipment must be in or on the vessel and/or the trailer. No equipment will be allowed under or alongside the vessel or trailer.

No Tarps: No plastic or "poly" tarps may be used. Custom fitted covers and boom tents designed for the marine environment are allowed. Any question regarding a particular cover will be resolved by the chair.

Insurance: Users of the dry moorage must have and demonstrate insurance with similar coverage as is required of wet moorage tenants at RCYC.

Liability: It is mutually agreed that RCYC does not accept**, and shall not be liable or responsible in any manner, for the safekeeping and conditions on the member's vessel, trailer, gear, fixture, or related equipment in the dry moorage.
