Per the Moorage Rules (A.1.d.), non-compliant boats may be evicted and their slip assigned to the next boat on the waiting list. And, speaking of the Waiting List, it is growing again, with three boats currently listed, plus two new applicants advancing through the membership process.

Spring work parties commence this month. From repairs to upgrades to cleanups, there is lots to do around the club. Boaters: A Reason to Check Your Signal Flares

ALEXANDRIA, Va., January 26, 2010 - Out of sight, out of mind? Unfortunately for a lot of recreational boaters, that's the reality when it comes to handheld signal flares. Stored aboard in some dark corner of the boat, most boaters don't think twice about their condition until they really need them. However, a feature in the latest issue of Boat Owners Association of The United States' HYPERLINK "http://www.boatus.com/seaworthy"Seaworthy Magazine reveals that failing to periodically inspect flares could have serious consequences.

This past summer a BoatU.S. employee opened a sealed orange storage canister that was located in his own 34foot sailboat's cabin and found that three handheld flares inside were ruined. Long cracks along their length had developed, and the flare's combustive ingredients were exposed and spilling out, rendering them useless. There were no signs of moisture inside or outside the canister. In an unexplained twist, three flares with older manufacturing dates -- stored in the same sealed orange canister - were found undamaged.

BoatU.S. first learned of this issue three years ago when a BoatU.S. member in Washington State reported a similar problem. In that case an O-ring sealed the flare container tightly, along with a band of duct tape in an attempt to further prevent any moisture from entering, yet three unexpired flares inside were destroyed.

"Most boaters know that emergency signal flares have expiration dates," said BoatU.S. Seaworthy editor Bob Adriance. "However, these two puzzling stories tell us that it's also best to check your flares a few times a season. I would also add flare guns to the list, too," he added.

The BoatU.S. Foundation for Boating Safety also offers a full report with real-world tests of aerial, smoke, and handheld flares at HYPERLINK

A Faster Rescue With GPS-Enabled Models

ANNAPOLIS, Md., February 22, 2010 - Sailboat racers, tournament fishermen and short-haul cruisers who occasionally travel far offshore have relied on the BoatU.S. Foundation's <u>Emergency Position Indicating</u> <u>Rescue Beacon (EPIRB) Rental Program</u> for over 14 years. In that time, Foundation EPIRBs have been rented out over 5,000 times with 62 lives saved. Now the Foundation has added GPIRBs (Global Position Indicating Radio Beacons) to the program which are easier to ship, easier to store and provide a more accurate location fix -- potentially leading to speedier rescues. The new GPIRBs rent for just \$65 a week at <u>www.BoatUS.com/Foundation/epirb</u>.

"Our rental program is a great way to improve personal safety while saving money for anyone who has an occasional need for an emergency rescue beacon," said BoatU.S. Foundation Program Manager David Carter.

The program offers McMurdo Smartfind Plus GPSenabled EPIRBs which normally retail for about \$800. Since it includes GPS technology in addition to the standard 406-MHz satellite signaling capabilities, a GPIRB provides search and rescue authorities with a more accurate location of a vessel in distress. When compared to standard EPIRBs, it also performs this lifesaving function in a fraction of the time which can enable rescuers to respond sooner.

The new GPIRBs are stored in a small "lunch box" size, waterproof case that makes them easier to stow aboard in more readily accessible locations. The unit's battery is also non-hazardous, allowing GPIRBs to be shipped by air and cutting down on delivery times. "If you order by 2 p.m. E.T., we can have the GPIRB on its way to you the same day," said Carter. An easy on-line booking system allows users to save their vessel and contact information for future use, or make changes to their itinerary if needed.
