As the sponsoring member, it is your responsibility to instruct your guests as to what is expected of them. Safety is a top priority. We all want guests and members to be safe. This is why all children under 13 must wear a life jacket whenever they are on the ramps or the docks. Even if children are just going from the parking lot to the Clubhouse they need to wear a life jacket. Safety and respect for the privacy of other members are reasons all guests walking on the docks or breakwater must be escorted by a member. Please ensure that your guests do not roam the moorage unescorted. The other responsibility when renting the Clubhouse is monitoring the parking lot gate, making sure that a responsible person will open the gate for guests as they arrive. Gate duty, providing life jackets and escorting guests do require planning, as does informing guests of what is expected of them. While we want your function in the Clubhouse to be fun, your rental does mean you are responsible for seeing that these policies are followed. Failure to do so will mean a forfeiture of your deposit and the loss of renting privileges. The Vice Commodore is the person who handles clubhouse rentals. 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### Avoiding Propeller Accidents by Alan Bergen BoatUS Representative

Guarding Against Propeller Accidents While on The Boat

- Everyone on the boat should be seated; never let passengers ride on the bow, gunwales or transom. Bob says he now sits inside his inflatable.
- Always wear your engine cutoff switch lanyard. Note that it may be necessary to shorten the lanyard when the operator is seated next to the engine.
- Stay at least 100-feet away from diver-down flags. Many divers have been killed or seriously injured by props. Turn away from diving areas; don't try to idle by. Be aware that divers have difficulty gauging distance underwater and will often stray more than the legal distances from the flag. Current can also cause divers to be swept away from the flag.
- When docking, don't let anyone onto the swim platform while the engine is running. Swim platforms tend to be slippery
- and people have fallen into the prop when the boat bounced off of a piling.

   When launching or un-grounding a boat, keep people in the water away from the stern and prop. In the struggle to get the boat into open water, it's easy to forget the prop is back there.
- Avoid letting anyone aboard drink heavily, especially when the boat is underway. Alcohol has been a factor in many prop injury claims.

Guarding Against Propeller Accidents While Water Skiing or Swimming

- Get back to skiers immediately. Skiers have been run down by other boats while they were waiting to be picked up. Life vests (required by law), wetsuits and t-shirts, as well as skis and kneeboards should be bright colors so that the skier will be easily visible to you and to other boat traffic. Skiers in the water who are waiting to be picked up should hold a ski out of the water so that they will be more visible to you as well as other boat traffic. The color of the equipment is very important; one skier who was run down had a kneeboard and life vest that were both black, which is less visible [than light colors] against the dark water.
- NEVER put the engine in reverse and back toward a skier (or anyone else) in the water. When you pick up a skier, make a gradual turn back and then shut off the engine before you are alongside. When the wind is blowing, always approach from
- Do not put the engine into gear until you see that everyone who was in the water is seated safely inside the boat. Just because you hear a voice a few feet away, don't assume he or she is aboard. In one recent injury claim, when a man sitting on the swim platform sounded as if he was on the boat, the skipper carelessly gunned the engine without looking back to
- Don't use an outboard or I/O's lower unit for re-boarding. Propellers are sharp, even when they're not moving.
- Never take a boat into a swimming zone.



At present we are filling two smaller-boat openings, working down the improvement list, and next moving on to the new-member list.

As increased river traffic increases wakes in summer months, be aware of where your spreaders and masthead line up in relation to the rigs of the boats on either side; you may need to move ahead or back in your slip. Also, be sure to have snubbers on bow and stern lines. Your mooring lines should be good quality nylon.

We have resumed the "take your boat out or crew on another boat" night, on Tuesdays at 6:00 PM. Check in at the Clubhouse patio and gather up members for crewing or go out with another member. This is a very informal activity; I suggest you dress for the weather and wear your pfd and maybe bring a snack if you are hungry. If you schlep along an extra can of pop or other beverage to share, that might be appreciated. You will get better acquainted with other members and share some boating time. No matter what sort of boat you own, large or small, power or sail, come on down.

The high water and fast current appear to be with us for several more weeks. While the colder springtime water is always riskier, this season is even more so as the current is running extra fast at three knots plus; so wear your PFD anytime you are on deck. Be cautious when under way and stay well upstream from the walk below your boat. Do not cut a corner when entering or leaving a fairway. Keep that bow pointed up stream.

Have fun, but keep your wits about you.
