Commodore's Log

Summer is over, and it is back to school, back from vacation, back to work; except for you retired folks it is back to whatever you want to do. However, if you are an active member of RCYC, it is likely back to work – work hours, that is, And there is plenty to do! Replacing the ramp surface with reinforced fiberglass grating is going to take a crew several hours. The prep work, sand blasting and painting of the steel structural members, will require a crew as well. I did test the existing paint on the steel for lead. The result was negative. If it had been found to contain lead, the project would be much more complicated. This work is to start on September 19th, before this report goes to press, in the hope that the ramps will be done by the end of October. To get involved, contact Karl Quade or Chuck Pennington.

We have a temporary tent over the ice maker. We are making progress getting it relocated and fitted with a more permanent cover.

As many of you may already know. we lost two of our elder members last month. Judy Dyer passed away August 24th, and Doug Buck on August 25th. We will miss them. In lieu of flowers, we have sent an equivalent donation to the organizations of their choice.

At our September Board Meeting it was brought up that some members had complained that the Clubhouse was not as clean as they expected when they rented it, although they were expected to leave it clean afterward or forfeit a cleaning deposit. What can we do to insure the Clubhouse is kept clean? First, we do have a steward assigned to clean weekly, but not daily; secondly, the day of the week it is cleaned by the steward is not always the same week day. I think this is where you and I come in – for the in-between cleaning. We all need to be conscientious in this regard. You and I are the maid service at the Club, whether assigned or not. If the garbage can is full, empty it in the dumpster; if the floor needs to be swept, grab a broom; if there are dirty glasses in the sink, wash them and put them in the cabinet, etc. In other words, if you make a mess, or if you come upon someone else's mess, clean it up. This kind of effort is contagious. By taking the initiative, you set an example others will follow. Then the clubhouse will always be presentable for our renters and for us all.
