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I have been saving a treat for November. I have read many cruising stories and I can't think of a better type of book to be reading on a rainy night. If I had to choose one sailing couple to read about it would be the Smeetons. Miles and Beryl were adventurers in the classic British mold. Beryl hiked solo through China and South America in the 1930's before meeting Miles in India. Miles was a decorated army officer. He had been stationed in Jamaica, then during WWII fought in North Africa, Burma and India. After the war they bought a yacht as a way to get their money out of England. They were going to sail to Saltspring Island, sell the boat and live on a farm Beryl had purchased sight unseen. They sailed to the farm, but they did not sell the yacht, Tzu Hang. Through the fifties and sixties they sailed all over the globe with their cats and sometimes their daughter. They wrote several books which are exciting to read. Miles makes their adventures seem like something you or I could do. The Sea was Our Village, 1973, is a good choice with which to start. It covers Miles and Beryl's search for a boat and buying Tzu Hang, the voyage to Saltspring Island and then their round-the-world cruise. The other books are **Once Is Enough**, 1960, which covers their first attempt to round Cape Horn. Sunrise to Windward, 1966, is about their trip from England to Japan. The *MIsty Islands*, 1969, is about their time in Japan, sailing to the Aleutians, down the West Coast and through the Panama Canal and back to England. Because the Horn is There, 1972, is about their second attempt to round Cape Horn. After reading these you will want to read their biography which was written by Miles' nephew Miles Clark, High Endeavors: The Extraordinary Adventures of Miles and Beryl Smeeton, 2002.

Moorage Matters

The first major wind storm arrived in mid-October and almost tore up a loosely furled RF genoa. It took four members to get it rewound tight and tied up. The noise of the wind and banging of the sail was amazing.

As we go into the winter storm months, make sure, very sure, that your head sail is really rolled in tight and the sheets led back at 90 degrees and cleated well.

Far better is to remove your RF genoa until spring. Also check on the snaps and zippers that hold the main cover and any other canvas.

If you find a loose cleat or loose rod through a dock, either fix it or let the Work Party Chair know to put it on the "squawk" list.

Days are getting a lot shorter and everyone must remember to lock up all three Clubhouse doors and the ramp gate at dusk.

November is when the Oregon Marine Board sends out the twoyear renewal notices. Be sure to get your renewal done by mail or on-line. The on-line version is easy and quick.

Dredging is about to start. While the normal operation is done from inside the cab where the hot blast of air from the radiator almost offsets the roar of the engine, any work outside is often freezing cold and wet. A cheery greeting and a report on the current river level is always appreciated by the crew out there in the noisy cab pulling levers. An occasional plate of cookies would be nice after an hour of moving swing cables in cold river water! (Just a hint...)

Frost and ice on the docks will be coming soon to our moorage. Be alert and cautious when accessing the docks. By December we sometimes face a week of winds over 30 knots, temperatures way under 25 degrees, and the odd power outage. Do NOT depend on an AC heater to keep your engine safe. Winterize or drain all fresh water systems.

ALISON MAZON RCYC PRESENTATION

RCYC member Alison Mazon gave our program at the September 19, 2012 general meeting. Alison, a professional marine surveyor and member of ABYC, NFPA, IAMI, and the Society of Accredited Marine Surveyors, spoke on oil spill prevention and wintertime boat heating.

During her surveying work Alison has seen oil spills result from a number of causes. Examples include loose oil attachments, such as injection pump fittings, oil coolers, fuel fill hoses, oil filters, gaskets, even rubber dipsticks, as well as crankcase breather hoses that are not attached to the air cleaner as they should be. Spare oil containers (both lubricant and fuel) are another problem. They need to be isolated in tubs, labeled, have sealing lids, and be anchored to prevent upsetting.

Oil will eventually find its way to the bilge and, if the bilge pump is working, will then get pumped out. Oil spills violate federal law, and any perceptible sheen is a violation. Alison's recommendations for containment start with a clean bilge. While pads are useful, they will not absorb all the oil in a dirty bilge. The problem of a bilge pump automatically pumping oily water may be avoided by the use of a solid state bilge pump switch—they are designed to not pump if they detect oil or fuel only. Also recommended is a oil catch tray under the engine. It can be designed to allow the passage of water through an integral conduit.

Alison's recommendation for winter boat heating is to use only enough to keep the boat from freezing. The problem of sustained wintertime heat on a boat is that the temperature differential between inside the boat and out causes moisture condensation. Unless the boat has exceptionally good air circulation, this will lead to mold and mildew. For those who elect to use sustained wintertime heat, common danger areas Alison has noticed include the use of non-ignition protected heaters, and inadequate wiring in general. The latter extends to basic boat wiring, AC sockets, extension cords, and adapters. Anytime a wire, socket, cord, or adapter is carrying



Phone: 503-286-4252 Fax: 503-289-9360 hppt://www.alisonmazon.com too much current it will heat up. And corroded wiring and/or bad connections will have increased resistance, which means they will heat up also.

Safe electric heating following ABYC standards typically includes the following: a tip-stable heater that will not fall over or a built in heater, thermostats that allow protection against freezing but will not run continually and overheat the vessel interior, do not use extension cords under any circumstances, ensure the AC heater is protected by a properly sized circuit breaker (typically 15 amp), ensure the wiring to the AC heater outlet is at least 14 gauge and that the outlet is properly grounded, check the wiring connections to the AC outlet to ensure they are tight, and place the heater where it is not near any flammable surfaces and where nothing can fall on it in the event the boat is heavily waked. If you are comfortable doing so, check that all of the AC connections at the shore power connector and the master AC breaker panel are tight otherwise -- have a marine electrician do this at least every few years. But, the best protection against freezing is to visit your boat frequently so no gremlins can surprise you. And remember, no amount of AC heat is any help if the power fails.
