


Nautical Reads by Judy Oxborrow


I love reading mysteries. And, when we are cruising on the boat, I usually have at least one or more sailing mysteries aboard the boat. Murder, mayhem, and sailing – what more could a reader want. I have several favorite sailing mystery writers. Sam Llewellyn, a British author, has written several. Blood Orange is a tale of world-class yacht racing, sinking, sabotage, blackmail and betrayal. Dead Reckoning is a tale of yacht design and sabotage set around a world-class race. Death Roll, Dead Eye, Maelstrom, Rip Tide, Clawhammer, Black Fish and Deadeye will all keep you on the edge of your seat and wide awake as you swing at anchor. Sam Llewellyn also wrote The Shadow in the Sands, a sequel to the classic Riddle in the Sands by Erskine Childers.



Recently I discovered sailing mysteries by Clyde W. Ford (a Bellingham resident) – all of which are set in the Pacific Northwest. In Red Herring, a Coast Guard patrol boat is sent to intercept a vessel headed towards an oil refinery. They discover the vessel was operating on autopilot and loaded with explosives, along with a note threatening the construction of a pipeline beneath an environmentally sensitive body of water. Fearing terrorism, an ex-Coast Guard commander, now a marine private investigator, Charlie Noble, agrees to find the man behind the plot. In Whiskey Gulf, a sailboat fails to arrive at its next port of call after crossing into a live fire naval exercise area. Intrigue, government secrecy and questions about the true identity of the couple sailing the ship will keep you guessing. And, in Precious Cargo, Charlie Noble is out for a relaxing cruise in home waters. When he pulls up his anchor to head out, he also pulls up a dead body. And, that is only in the opening pages. But most of all, being a sailor and from the Pacific Northwest, Clyde Ford gets the sailing parts right!!

Paul Garrison, a pen name for Justin Scott who is often called the Dick Francis of the seas, has written a number of murder mysteries under both names. The five under the Paul Garrison name are great reads. Fire and Ice is about a couple, both doctors, and their daughter who are kidnapped at sea in a most unusual way. Sea Hunter is about the hunt for a unknown creature in the Caribbean. Buried at Sea is the tale of a young man who is hired as a deckhand and trainer to a wealthy yachtsman headed for Rio de Janeiro. Only the boat changes course to head for Africa while being pursued by someone who wants them all dead. The Ripple Effect is about a young woman sailing to find her father. He was an investment banker fleeing creditors and legal inquiries, and the daughter is the only one on his trail that wants him alive. Red Sky at Morning takes place in New York City during Fleet Week. A tugboat captain and other hardy sailors become the only ones who can stop a plot to cause destruction and havoc.





Randy Wayne White has a whole series of novels set along the Gulf Coast of Florida. They feature a retired NSA agent and marine biologist Doc Ford. Kathy Brandt has written several books set in the Caribbean involving a CSI diver, Hannah Sampson, — Swimming with the Dead, Dark Water Dive, Dangerous Depths and Under Pressure. Bernard Cornwell, a British author famous for his Sharpe's series, has written several sailing mysteries — Wildtrack, Killer Wake, Scoundrel, Crackdown and Stormchild. Then there is another sailing mystery series written by a Pacific Northwest resident, currently living in Camas, -- Valerie Wilcox. In Sins of Silence, her character Kellie Montgomery (a sailing instructor) finds a yacht drifting outside a marina and its owners are dead. In Sins of Betrayal, Kellie Montgomery deals with environmentalists while searching for a missing sailing friend. And, in Sins of Deception, Kellie's client for a charter is arrested for murder.

And, these are just a few of the mysteries I have read and collected over the years. I haven't even touched the classical nautical books we are all so familiar with. While cruising, our boat was always known for having books, especially nautical mysteries, aboard. At the start of a cruise, we would pack a small duffle bag with books. We knew it was time to come home, when I had read all the books we had packed.

The first half of the year and its work parties are over. One of the jobs of the Vice Commodore is to keep track of our work hours, work with members who have not completed their work hours and resolve any shortages. More on that later, but first some statistics: RCYC members have put in over 1335 work hours in the first half of this year. This breaks down to 6.6 hours per member family. That is not the whole story. There are 85 member families that are life members and are exempt from work hours. These exempt members have put in 287 work hours for an average of 3.4 hours each. That is the RCYC spirit -- lend a hand, even if you are not required to do so. When we factor out the hours of the exempt members, the average hours worked by RCYC members goes up to 8.8 per member family. It should be noted that Brad Jensen has the largest single recorded number of work hours (65.5 hours!) and he is exempt.

There are many reasons that a member family cannot fulfill their work hours responsibility. Waivers and deferments may be granted by a vote of the Board of Directors for health or other reasons. The key here is to not wait until the last moment to call me up and ask what you can do to get your hours . Our first fall work party is scheduled for Saturday, September 14. If you have had a hard time getting in your hours in the first half of the year, mark your calendar, get to one of the first work parties and get your obligation out of the way. If you are really pressed for time, consider signing up for one of the chair positions or Clubhouse cleaning which will allow for a flexible schedule.

Reciprocals by Tom & Kathy Nelson

Our featured club this month is Kingston Cove Yacht Club in Kingston, WA. It is located in Appletree Cove about 13 nautical miles north of Seattle and almost directly across Puget Sound from the town of Edmonds.

KCYC has two reciprocal slips at the head of the guest dock (part of the Port of Kingston) and allows guests to stay for one night free. There is water and 30-amp power on the dock. The marina office has showers, a laundromat, and a large floating fuel dock. The clubhouse is a short walk across the city park and their bar is usually open Friday evening from 5:00 to 9:00 pm. During the summer their outdoor grill is available and they will provide salads and baked potatoes for a fee of \$5.00 per person.

Kingston has a number of cafes and restaurants within easy walking distance. The large grocery store is a number of blocks away, but the Port of Kingston has a small electric car that is free to use for local shopping. We have used the car a couple of times when we needed to stock up on groceries.

During the summer the city park, adjacent to the marina, has a Saturday farmers market and in August there are evening concerts and a beer garden. Adjacent to the park and marina is the terminal for the Washington State Ferry that runs between Kingston and Edmonds. Passenger fare round trip is \$7.70. The town of Edmonds is fun to explore and it too has a large Saturday market and is also the home and headquarters of Rick Steves, the travel guru. His main office is about a tenminute walk from the ferry and houses a myriad of travel information, books, videos, and travel gear. We often stop here to plan our upcoming trips. An additional option is to take the train from Edmonds into Seattle for the day. The trip is short and inexpensive -- a unique way to explore Seattle while on the boat.

Kingston is one of our favorite stops on our way north to Oak Harbor or Anacortes, and we often stay two nights.

Oregon Offshore Race

The Oregon Offshore was a result of a challenge set forth by Jack Gainer (Raindrop) and Richard Kipp (Vagabundo) to all the Portland area sailors. They wanted an event that would put the Oregon racing community into "offshore" racing rivaling Seattle, BC, and even California. The organizers of the Oregon Offshore tried several courses over the years and the boats now finish in Victoria, B.C. The spirit of that first race lives on in Yaquina Bay YC's Bridge to Bridge race.

By the time you read this, the Oregon Offshore race will be just a memory. Racers were racing Swiftsure on May 25, while many of us were enjoying a cruise to Hadley's Landing. This year, the Oregon Offshore had twenty-seven entries, seven of whom were RCYC members.

Cool Change, a C&C Landfall 38 was skippered by Frank Noragon. Frank has sailed several Offshore races, first as crew on Thirsty, and for the past several years on Cool Change.

Jerry Barnes iwas skipper of Desperado, a New York 36. This was Desperado's first Offshore, but Jerry obtained notoriety when a whale hit his previous boat, L'Orca, shortly after the start of the 2011 race. News of that unfortunate incident reached around the globe via the internet.

Katzenjammer, a C&C 34, was skippered by Jim Calnon. This was Jim's third Offshore, and he was taking the race very seriously. Jim spent several weeks practicing bar crossings with his crew.

Rage, with Steve Rander at the helm, is a perennial winner, and holds the record for the fastest time from Astoria to Victoria.

Joby Easton was racing Raindrop for the first time on this race. Joby and his crew Bill Huseby, raced (and won) the double-handed race to Hawaii several years ago.

Souffle raced in the cruising division (without spinnaker). Phil Lewis has crewed on a number of Offshore races, but never sailed his boat. He just wanted to see what it would be like.

Finally Wave Dancer, with more than any other Offshore races under her keel (except for Rage). Steve Moshofsky is back, year after year.
