The crossing was gentle and warm as we were just below a major spring storm. We stopped off at Madeira, Gibraltar, Sardinia and Sicily before turning north into the Bay of Naples and then on to Rome. Sightseeing in Rome, a visit to the Vatican, then by train to Sorrento. We met many wonderful people, learned a little Italian, ate delicious pasta dishes,

took a boat to Capri for the day, and toured Roman and Greek ruins. I felt like an antique looking at the relics of our Western Culture.

Our loan comes up for renewal every 5 years or so. This cycle, we were able to drop the rate of interest paid and save quite a bit. Rather than pay a lesser amount, your board elected to pay the same that we have been and use the "extra" to pay off the loan at an accelerated rate. It has been years since we reviewed our insurance policy. The review shows that our exposure has gone up with no corresponding increase in coverage. We are correcting that. Additionally, we are checking to be sure that our coverage actually covers us. It is easy to get lost in the "insurance speak" but it turns out that we can request a plain English description of the policy. That will be a useful read.

The dredge is out of the water at Schooner Creek. I hear that it does not look too bad, and that no impending doom was discovered. I'm sure that a complete report will be coming.

Today I thought I would leave you with a few words of wisdom that came my way. They appear to apply to so much of what we do.

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Going into June, I plan on filling a couple of port- tie slips for smaller boats. Temporary relocation of a group of boats on walk four delayed filling one of these, and then another slip just recently opened up. I expect to get those temporarily-moved boats and their finger back in place by June.

The folks on the #1 Improvement List will get first priority for these openings. Once they have chosen, I will contact the members on the #3 List.

Dinghy storage: If you remove your little boat from the rack for summer cruising, be sure that you have a readable, durable name plate marking "your" spot.

Regarding mooring lines and snubbers; we recently had a mooring line break due to two apparent problems: I) a very powerful wind gust, and 2) the line was some sort of poly line with an inadequate breaking strength. Note that some of the colorful braid-on-braid the chandlers sell is not up to the task. I would advocate half inch (or larger) three-strand premium nylon. New England Rope makes a high quality product, and there certainly may be other comparable brands. Please do not go too cheap on this. (Of course that's just as true for your anchor line, too.)

If you are going on vacation for a while, whether two weeks or two months, drop an email to the Billions and the Coreys with your departure date and estimated return date. Sometimes a slip is needed for a *reciprocal moorage* visitor.

Security Note: On opening day there was a rather daring daylight break-in of a vehicle in our parking lot. Always make sure that the clubhouse and ramp gate are locked up at sundown. Keep an eye out for unauthorized visitors. If you leave your vehicle in the lot for any period of days, consider removing your registration papers and garage door transmitter taking these with you.


In the past month we lost two longtime members, Jerry Randall and Elden Stender.

The Cruising Corner by Ron Moran

For the last two months the topic of this column focused on safety equipment. I am going to finish up the subject with this very short column about Personnel Flotation Devices (PFDs).

PLEASE, WHEN OUT ON YOUR BOAT, USE ONE

The type you us is up to you. There are styles that will fit almost any activity you want to do on the water: recreational use, water sports, day sailing, offshore sailing, fishing, offshore power boating, paddle sports and so on. Most styles can be had in inflatable and are inherently buoyant. PFDs are available in all sizes from infant to adult. You can even get them for your pets.

Remember, **PFDs don't do you any good if you don't wear them.** Develop a policy on your boat for when you, your crew and you guest will wear PFDs. The best policy is to have them on any time you are out of the cabin, no matter what the weather. Even on hot days, self-inflating PFDs aren't too uncomfortable to wear.

Regarding self-inflating PFDs; they do not count toward the requirement of one properly sized PFD for each person on a boat unless you are wearing them.

Let's have a safe and happy boating season.
