

2014 Construction Wrap-up

2014 has been a busy construction year at Rose City. Here's what has been done and who did it:

Water System Upgrade: Boss Chuck Pennington and his team of crack plumbers (pun almost intended) Jim Douglass, Jim Hackley, Karl Quade, Steve Petersen, and Dennis Stewart, replaced the old fragile PVC piping on Walk 3 with modern, freeze-proof HDPE (high density polyethylene) pipe. The "freeze-proof" does not mean that we can leave the water on all winter, as other parts of the system will break if frozen while full, but this HDPE pipe, the same material used for our dredge discharge pipe (see photos on right), is virtually indestructible. After Walks I and 2 are upgraded, our water system in the marina will be all HDPE. Thanks, plumbers!

Marina Shore Power and Lighting: This past spring, the Walk 5 utility pedestals were upgraded with the installation of GFI circuit breakers and new pagoda light fixtures with LED bulbs, all installed by Ron and Karen Billion. In October, we installed new shorepower powerheads on the Walks 2 and 3 utility pedestal posts, featuring GFI breakers and internal

LED lighting, together with pagoda fixtures with LED bulbs. Ron and Karen again led (sort of related to LED) the charge, with a little assistance from a cracker-jack electrical contractor and just a bit from me. Our shore power distribution system is now 60% GFI protected and our boat-walk lighting is now 80% LED, including the Walk 4 work led by Mark Basel last year. Great work, Ron and Karen!

Wood Piling Replacement: Our 2-year program to replace our remaining worn-out wood piling with new steel piling came to a successful conclusion at the end of October. I am sure that all of you are glad to see this work come to an end, as confusing and disruptive as the project was this year. My thanks to everyone for your patience. The work itself went smoothly, thanks to a stellar crew, which included: Steve Barrett (design work); Loren Beach (chief of marina boat scrambles); Paul Glynn (chief of turbidity); Karen Billion (chief of photography); Don Belshaw and PYC Ringer Dick Dominey (marine mammal monitors); Karen Billion, Carl Corey, Pam Corey, Jim Corey [Carl's brother], Jim Hackley, Bob Phillips, and Jim Pickett, (who did

the piledriver arrived, worked as pile bucks during piledriving, and put things back together after the piledriver left); Judy Oxborrow (chief of chefs, who organized a team of volunteer cooks to feed the crews but whose volunteers were never given a chance to burn the bacon due to all of the scheduling changes); and to all of the rest of you who volunteered to do anything asked of you but were not given a chance to help because of our good fortune having too many able and willing volunteers. And the Rons, Billion and Moran, who helped with just about everything, including running the show while the piledriver was here and I was 6000 miles away. Thanks to both of you, and to everyone else!! We should not have to worry about piling again for many, many more years.

Moorage Matters

Several days of high winds recently resulted in at least three dock boxes blowing into the water. At least one of those was well filled, and the lid was latched. When the gusts repeatedly hit 40 mph, things really do start to move. Given that we know that unsecured lids blow open and then act as a sail to pull a box off the dock, do have your latch secured.

Next, put some major weight in the bottom. And just to be sure, run a line from the box itself, or at least the hasp, down to the corner of your triangle then under and around the frame underneath. To do this you would need to unscrew and lift the triangle up, attach a line led to the corner, and then reattach the triangle.

Last, tie that line to the box. I realize that the new plastic triangles do not yet have hold-down screws, and this will be addressed by a future work party.

We have also had a boat suffer two burst fenders, and another had a broken snubber.

If you have not checked your dock lines for chafe, do it now.

As of this writing, the dredge has finished the Walk I fairway and is about to start on Walk 2. If you are using your

boat in a fairway where the *J. Randall* is operating, let them know when you need to get by. They can normally move aside for a minute and drop a cable. And, be patient.

Watch your step when visiting the moorage any day that's windy and icy, and stay warm.





NAUTICAL READS - HISTORICAL FICTION

I am a fan of C. S. Forester's Horatio Hornblower series and Patrick O'Brian's Aubrey/Maturin books. I like historical nautical fiction. Forester and O'Brian represent the two poles of this genre (genre: a specific subcategory of fiction). While there were earlier naval fiction books dealing with life aboard naval ships and battles at sea, Forester defined the genre with the Horatio Hornblower books. They were action packed page turners that always turned out well for Hornblower. Maybe they were a bit shallow, but they were thrilling. Book one is Mr. Midshipman Hornblower. On the other hand, there are the O'Brian Aubrey Maturin books. They are slower paced and literary. They have character development, science and a sense of place, as well as thrilling battles. Start with Master and Commander. Both of these series are great, and they will give you hours of reading enjoyment. The real question is what to read next? Well, there are lots of other choices. I am going to start with the newest options first and in future columns work back in time.

Most of the nautical historical fiction books have been about English sailors in the Napoleonic Wars. One change in the recent books is they are about different times and navies. First books in the series are listed. Let's start with I. D. Davies' series the Journals of Mathew Quinton. In Gentleman Captain, (published in 2010), the time is 1662 and Charles II is on the throne. Quinton's first command sank out from under him, and the king has given him a new ship to sail to Scotland to fight the rebels. Will he mend his reputation? If you like O'Brian, you should enjoy this series.

Richard Woodman's Kit Faulkiner naval adventure is set even earlier, in 1618, during the English Civil War. Kit starts out as a 12 year old boy on a merchant ship. The series has a lot of history and action beginning in A Ship for the King (2011).

David Donachie's John Pearce series is set in the familiar English navy fighting Napoleon, but John Pearce is a pressed sailor so you get another view of the navy in By the Mast Divided (2005).

Another series in this same time frame, but with the American Revolution as the setting, is William Hammond's Cutler Family Chronicles. Richard Cutler joins the American Navy to help fight the Revolutionary War. Book one is A Matter of Honor (2007).


