Vice Commodore's Report

The first half of the year and its work parties are over. One of the jobs of the Vice Commodore is to keep track of our work hours, work with members who have not completed their work hours and resolve any shortages. More on that later, but first here are some statistics. RCYC members have put in over 1,340 work hours in the first half of this year. This breaks down to 8.07 hours per member family.

That is not the whole story. There are 40 member families that are life members and are exempt from work hours. These exempt members have put in 89.5 work hours for an average of 2.23 hours each. That is the RCYC spirit -- lend a hand, even if you are not required to do so. When we factor out the hours of the exempt members, the average hours worked by RCYC members goes up to 9.92 per member family. It should be noted that an "inactive" member has recorded a number of work hours (24 hours!), and he is exempt.

There are many reasons that a member family cannot fulfill their work hours responsibility. Waivers and deferments for health or other reasons may be granted by a vote of the Board of Directors. The key here is to not wait until the last moment to call Rick Samuels [503-799-4255] and ask what you can do to get your hours .

Our first fall work party is scheduled for Saturday, July 18th followed by Saturday, September 12th. If you have had a hard time getting in your hours in the first half of the year, mark your calendar, get to one of the first work parties and get your obligation out of the way. If you are really pressed for time, consider signing up for one of the chair positions or Clubhouse cleaning which will allow for a flexible schedule.

OpenCPN (http:// http://opencpn.org/ocpn/) is a full featured Open Source (read free) chart plotter program that runs on PC, Mac, Linux and soon Android. It is often used by world cruisers as their primary chart plotter. For the July General Meeting program, I will be taking a PC and loading OpenCPN on it and going through a few setup options so that you can get a head start with it. I've been working through the OpenCPN manual and discovering just how very capable it is.

Sometime in August, the Commodore will appoint the Nominating Committee that I will be chairing (See By-Laws Art. XI.I). Our task will be to identify and nominate members to fill the open positions on the Board of Directors for the coming year and nominate a slate of officers for 2016. The Invaders Are Here!

The bank from the parking lot leading down to the docks is looking more like a jungle every day. Actually it is now covered almost entirely with invasive species, a.k.a. Noxious Weeds, defined by the State of Oregon as a plant that has the potential to cause severe negative impact to Oregon's agricultural economy and natural resources; or that endangers native flora and fauna by its encroachment in the forest, range and conservation areas.

With the help of multiple conservation organizations including the Columbia River Land Trust, The Audubon Society (Backyard Habitat program) and the East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District, we are undertaking the process of doing a thorough assessment of the noxious weeds on the bank and researching safe, environmentally sound options for removing them and preventing their re-growth.



The innocent looking Yellow Flag Iris, growing on the bank about halfway down the west ramp just above the high water line, is on the Multnomah County Early Detection Rapid Response list for highly noxious plants.

I get reports of cleats on the concrete finger docks being loose. If you have one that needs tightening, you can do this with an end wrench. If the nut is bottoming out on the shoulder of the bolt and the cleat is still loose, put some washers under the nut. There should be some galvanized washers in the shop.

Winds have been gusting to mid and upper 20's this week in the evening. Check your lines for chafe and fenders for wear.

Our propane BBQs on the patio are in the news. Just recently someone left the tank valve on and also the burner on! Escaping gas was noticed around the clubhouse. This is a serious violation of "common sense". If you or any group you are with is finished up using BBQ, turn Off The Gas Supply Valve!

The Tuesday evening sailing is going well. We enjoyed good winds recently after getting off to a slow start with several no wind weeks. Still the same protocol — meet at the patio deck at 6 pm, dressed for the weather and wearing your PFD.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

Please don't panic when you receive your billings this quarter. Remember in April, the membership voted to increase the loan fund by \$47.00 per quarter for all Active and Active Life members and by \$23.50 for all Inactive Members. This increase in funds was necessary in order to support a loan to purchase a new dredge. For most members, billings should consist of seven or eight line item entries: Membership Dues, Capital Improvement, Activities Fee, Dredging Fee, Loan Fund, Moorage, Electricity and/or Ice. Our guest columnist this month is Judy Oxborrow. I want to encourage all members to think about being a guest columnist as it gives great variety to the book column.

E-Reader Paradise for Summer Cruises

Years ago, our boat got the nickname "The Bookmobile" because we always had books aboard for reading while on summer cruises. We judged the length of our cruising by the books in the duffle bag we packed. When I had read all the books, we knew it was time to come home. E-Readers and tablets have blown that idea totally out of the water!! However, for your Lazy Days cruising, here are some great sailing e-books that might prove tempting.

First, try books by P. J. Alderman. She has two mysteries set on the Columbia River and in the Astoria area – "A Killing Tide" and "Phantom River." Both plots center around the operation of the Columbia River Bar Pilots and US Coast Guard.


Just going into the Kindle section of Amazon and searching for Nautical Fiction brings up a number of nautical reads. One I just downloaded was "Sea Bitch: Four Tales of Nautical Noir" by Christine Kling. The tales feature deadly, dangerous women and boats. Her heroine, Seychelle Sullivan, has been touted as a worthy successor to John McDonald's hero, Travis McGee. She has a number of nautical reads published ("Cross Current, Bitter, End Wreckers Key, Circle of Bones, and Dragon's Triangle") and I am slowly working my way through them all.

Another great author to read is Brian Callison. He is a former Merchant Marine and British military officer, so his books have a decidedly British flair and most are set around his merchant marine service. Some of them are: "A Flock of Ships, Trapp's War, A Plague of Sailors, The Trojan Hearse, Ferry Down, A Thunder of Crude", etc. There is a whole series with Trapp in the title and featuring his character Captain Edward Trapp, who is described as being unapologetically amoral and frequent Captain of decrepit ships and questionable crews.

If you want more current nautical fiction, consider the works of Jeffrey Parfitt. This author was born in 1959 and ran away to sea at age 16. At age 30, he became an investigator for London Customs for six years. Then he went back to sea as the Captain of a dive boat. His books ("Sea of Jackals, Blood Alley, Snowfall, and Shadow of Fear") all have modern day themes.


Then there are the true stories of disaster and survival at sea. In January, our meeting featured Coast Guard Commander Nevada Smith who was involved in search and rescue operations after tropical storm Andrea in 2007. Those operations were featured in a book titled "A Storm Too Soon" by Michael J. Tougias. This same author has a number of books – "Rescue of the Bounty: Disaster and Survival in Superstorm Sandy; The Finest Hours: The True Story of the Coast Guard's Most Daring Sea Rescue; Ten Hours Until Dawn: The True Story of Heroism and Tragedy About the Can Do; Overboard! A True Blue Water Odyssey of Disaster and Survival; Fatal Forecast: An Incredible True Tale of Disaster and Survival at Sea."

So regardless of the genre you want to read, an E-Reader or tablet means no more book bags (less weight on the boat) and hopefully longer cruises. Most of the ones I have downloaded have been free or under \$3. And, e-readers have their own lighting, so you don't need the cabin lights on late at night draining power and this makes for a happier Captain too!

The Cruising Corner by Ron Moran

The down river cruise, Lazy Days, is coming up the end of this month. For those of you that are new members in the club this is one of the most popular cruises the club has. It is scheduled as a one week cruise down the Columbia to Astoria and back. Some members don't think one week is long enough and stretch it out to two weeks.

The dates and locations are listed elsewhere in the Foghorn and will be posted at the club. Please keep in mind the location are just suggestions. Some members just go to the places listed; others may skip a location and go to another spot. Whatever you do, let's all try meet at Cathlamet for the potluck on Thursday.

If you have not been to some or all the places listed, check out the information on page 57 & 58 of the current RCYC Yearbook. Also the following will be helpful.

Martin Island – Don't cut too close to the bottom end of the island and stay close to the Washington shore when first entering the channel between the island and Washington shore. Just inside the channel there is a small sand bar coming out from the Washington side so stay a little right of the channel center. Once in the channel stay toward the center. DO NOT get close to the Highway side of the channel at the upper end it's sanded in. After you make the turn to the right, stay closer to the east side of center and away from the top end of the island until you are at the opening into the pond. Again, stay toward the center of the opening. Once in the pond the depth is consistent. Logs were stored in the pond for many years so there are many sunken logs and cables on the bottom so use a trip line on your anchor.

Walker Island – The recommended way to get in is to go around the lower end of Walker and come back up the channel between Walker and the Oregon shore. Stay in the center of the channel; there are many old pilings next to shore.

Cathlamet – If you know the way or follow someone that does, you can come in the upper end following the channel between Puget Island and the Washington shore. If not, then follow the main channel around Puget and come up to the entrance to the marina from the down river side. Don't cut the corners when entering Elochoman Slough from the river, stay in the center. When making the turn into the marina, don't go much past the entrance and stay a little right of center until you are inside. If this is you first time at Cathlamet, it's a short walk to a grocery store. At the marina, you will find good tasting water and there is fuel that is not over priced.

The trip to **Astoria** can be a smooth as glass or very rough so make sure you boat is ready for what ever condition you may face.

SAFETY: There is a lot of ship/tug/barge traffic in the lower river so keep a good watch-- not just in front, but also behind. And, please wear your PFD's.
