#### **SECURITY REMINDER:**

There have been some problems and misunderstandings about the proper way to dispose of trash, recycling and hazardous materials at RCYC. There has been non-motor oil left in the oil recycling area. If it is not motor oil, you are responsible for disposal. We cannot mix it with the motor oil. Take it to METRO. Please make sure your trash and recycling ends up in the proper dumpster or bin. Please do not leave junk near the dumpsters with a free sign on it. If you don't want it, don't expect someone else to dispose of it for you.

The Nominating Committee will be appointed by September 12. Karen Finch will be chairing the committee. They will be nominating Officers and Directors. Dave Reilly and I will be looking to fill several vacancies in the committee chairs. If you are interested in a new challenge, talk to us and we will let you know what opportunities are available. ## Vice Commodore's Report

This summer the Board has been considering the fees charged when we rent the Clubhouse. Even Club "old-timers" are having a hard time remembering the last time we visited the Clubhouse rental fees. That, and the fact that some members have questioned the equity of the fee structure, and others have questioned whether or not we should even rent the Clubhouse. This has prompted the Board's consideration. You can find the current fees charged for renting the Clubhouse under paragraph 4 of the RCYC Clubhouse Use Rules in your Yearbook.

At its August meeting, the Board discussed a motion that would affect Corinthian users and members renting the Clubhouse for organizations of which they are a member. If passed the motion would include a galley use fee and would equalize the fees paid by those renters. No change is included for members renting the Clubhouse for family gatherings. If passed this motion would lower the rental fees for members and would significantly increase the fees paid by Corinthian users. After discussion of the fee question, the Board decided to defer action until its October meeting. The Board is refining its analysis of the Clubhouse fees and there will be a discussion of the Clubhouse rental fees at the September General Meeting.

While it won't last forever there is still lots of summer left. There are Club cruises, Walk parties, and lots of warm long days to enjoy your boat and fellow Club members. Get out there and have some fun!


## **Nautical Reads**

Thank you to all the many individuals and groups that give countless time and contributions to getting children off the couch and onto the water. The programs we support teach lifelong skills.



# **Moorage Matters**

As we go into our annual low water season, you might want to bookmark this site. Unlike tide prediction algorithms found on the 'net and in your little printed tide booklets, this is a real time river level readout from a gauge just west of the bridge, in Vancouver. Times will be a bit later east, at our moorage.

I have not (yet) heard of anyone grounding inside our marina at low tide, but I do know of boats running aground on that shoal outside the entrance of Tomahawk Bay.

Note that it also has predictions extending out for a few days. This is based on calculations of water releases from the dams upstream, included into an extension of river level trends up to present.

Trivia: You can thank RCYC at least in part for the future prediction part of this table. Several years ago, this site went 'live' online, and we all liked it a lot and several of us asked if it could be extended beyond the current date and time since river forecasting is good for a few days into the future. NOAA cooperating agencies must have agreed, and the "forecast part" of it has appeared regularly, ever since.

Notice that the difference between high and low water is several feet. Near the banks, where our moorage is, there is zero flow and sometimes an upstream push as the water rises.

Backing out of your slip can be quite different when there is no current.



And she will present her incredible story at Portland Yacht Club October 6th. Laura is now 20 years old and married but started her trip at age 14. Her planning started when she was 11. Can you imagine your child approaching you at age eleven and saying, "Dad, I want to be the youngest to sail around the world." Her father, Dick, told her that he supported her but did not have the financial means to send her on her way and that she would need sponsors. A year later Laura approached her father again and told him that she had written letters and that she now had sponsors. That is just the beginning of her story.

exploit was made by Jullian Schlesinger. Laura has also written a book entitled "One Girl One Dream." The book is available at Powells.

# ESSENTIAL FINANCIAL INFORMATION FOR ALL MEMBERS

With the merger of our bookkeeping service with ebs Associates and the transfer of all accounts to them, we are working on a number of improvements in service. These include the ability to submit reimbursement requests via email and the ability to pay quarterly billings by having them automatically deducted from your bank account (ACH). We are hoping to have some of these improvements in place by the quarterly billing in October.

First, we are setting up the October billings to be released via email to all members with an email address. This step is essential to the implementation of ACH payments and will reduce our bookkeeping costs. If you absolutely do not want your billing sent via email, notify Judy as soon as possible. Deadline for billing changes is September 25.

During this transition, it is essential that all members direct inquiries on reimbursement vouchers and billings to the Club Treasurer Judy Oxborrow. Inquiries can be sent via email to judy87807@centurylink.net or made by phone to (503) 652-1549. The new bookkeeping firm bills by the hour and any telephone calls, emails, etc., directly to them increases our bookkeeping bills. In the vast majority of cases, Judy can answer the questions by logging online to the bookkeeping records. If she cannot answer the questions, she will refer them to the bookkeeping service via a procedure designed to reduce the impact on our costs. Judy will acknowledge your email and give you an approximate estimate on when to expect an answer so if you don't receive an acknowledgement, there was a snag in sending or delivery. When we have the final details on these improvements, an announcement will be made via email and in the October Foghorn.


