Dig We MUST

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Vice Commodore's Report

As noted on the Club calendar, the Clubhouse remodel has begun. The on-going work should continue through February. Limited use of the Clubhouse is possible, but calendar activities have been curtailed due to the remodel. The galley will be the next phase of the remodel; one should not expect the galley to be functional.

Work hours — When you perform your work hours at the Club, please accurately and legibly record those work hours so that you will receive credit for hours worked. If a crew member, friend or other family member is working hours on behalf of your membership, please also note the name to which the hours should be credited. Each membership is required to perform 12 work hours for the year: 6 hours for the first half and 6 hours for the second half. If desired, the entire 12 work hours may be performed in the first half of the year. An assessment of \$50.00 per work hour will be added to your quarterly billing on July 1 for each hour not worked.

If you are unable to perform the work hours, you should contact the Commodore or Vice Commodore to address your situation and ask for a waiver or deferment to the second half for those hours.

Clubhouse Repairs – Help Needed

Just a reminder, the Clubhouse will be undergoing some needed repairs starting right after the first of the year.

We will be replacing the floors in both of the heads. The galley floor will also be repaired and, if money is available, we will be refacing all the cabinets in the galley. There are also several minor repairs that will be undertaken.

Because of the work, Clubhouse usage will be limited to Board meetings and General Meetings for the months of January and February. During this time the plan is to have at least one functioning head at all times.

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Moorage Matters

We have made progress on getting name plates for each dinghy on our racks. There are still several without owners, so if one belongs to you, get your name plate attached. If you have not yet tied your kayak or canoe down, do so; 35 knots of sustained east wind can make one go airborne.

If you still have the expired 2017 registration stickers on your family yacht, get your 2019 stickers on right away. I got our stickers changed out on a dry day a few weeks ago and found that a heat gun (or hair dryer) helped to loosen the old ones so they would peel off. I still had to use solvent (acetone) and one of our old well used "tea towels" from Costco to remove the glue residue.

I am presently filling a couple of slips where members have moved away or sold their boats. On the other side of the ledger, we are about to induct four new members. The Waiting List is growing again. After a very successful dredging season, moorage depth is back to normal. Our long-time sand hauler has removed nearly all the pile of sand we created and has already excavated and shaped the settling pond for use again next fall.

As your boat insurance comes up for renewal throughout the year, remember to send a copy of the declarations page to Gary Whitney. Email attachment is fine. Note: This is a change from past years when Judy Oxborrow was keeping track of this requirement. To qualify for a slip in the moorage, you are required to have current registration stickers on your boat and to also send in your current insurance declarations page

Thank you to the member(s) who have been earning some work hours by poling woody debris down the inside or out to the end of walk one and back into the main current. Every time the river rises a few feet, additional trees wash off of the beaches upstream and float our way. One caveat: while this work does not require wearing a PFD like using our work boats, it's a lot safer to have one on when leaning over the ice wall and pushing chunks of wood with a pike pole.

Dock Box note: If you have a storage box on your triangle, you must (a) secure the lid so that wind will not blow it open and (b) tie the box down to the loop of line on the triangle to keep it from being blown into the river.

As always, be careful transiting icy docks during the next couple of months.

In January the RCYC Board voted to proceed with a project to improve our security by installing a keypad for use in opening the main gate on Marine Drive. Once the project is completed, you will be able to enter the main gate by using either your key fob or by entering a numerical key at the keypad. You will still need to use your physical key to access the gate at the top of the ramp, the Clubhouse doors, and the storage areas. The system we are installing will allow for the addition of a keypad at the gate at the top of the ramp. So if you notice trenches in the parking lot, that is for the conduit needed for the keypad project. Later in the Winter we will begin work on the dumpster pad to be installed next to the ice machine pad. Lots of work going on!

In addition, the Club will host three beer can races in June and July. If you don't know, beer cans are free casual races sponsored by a number of Clubs, starting in May and ending in August.
