Moorage Matters

It's been a mild winter in Portland, so far. I finally did winterize our engine, but that may not have been necessary. I heard that the wind and rain removed one hatch canvas cover on another boat.

Heading into spring, there are one or two openings on the dinghy racks. Put a durable name plaque on your spot, whether you have used that spot historically, or are just now claiming it.

After I replaced one chafed dock line, I wrapped some heavy cloth chafing material around the replacement line where it passes over the deck edge. After recently acquiring a little "fender hand pump", our fenders no long have their cold weather dent in the sides. You could perhaps use a football inflation needle and our shop compressor, but one little error and you will blow a rip in a \$50 fender. You want enough pressure to make the sides straight, but not enough to put a bulge in the middle.

We have a several open slips for boats around 30 feet long and under 9 feet wide. Members with large boats will need to wait longer for openings on Walks 1, 2, and 5.

The spring moorage inspection by the Commodore will happen soon. If you have not applied your new registration stickers, get them attached. Do not put this off. The River Patrol Deputy that recently visited us pointed out that the fine for lapsed or missing stickers is about \$100. Besides, having them on your boat is a requirement to moor a boat here. It is just that simple.

Insurance is also required, and you need to send a copy of your Declarations page to our insurance coordinator, Gary Whitney, at a special address for this purpose. Email to Gary at: RCYC.insurance@gmail.com

Pressure water on all the headwalks should be back on by the end of our first March work party, and then the dirt and mold of winter can be washed off.

Local Government Presents Potential Laws for River Use

As the new year and new legislative session gets underway, our local officials are mulling over some potential rules and regulations for our waterways. The Columbia River Yachting Association is keeping an eye on the following issues and bills that could impact boaters like RCYC members.

The City of Portland is presenting their plan for updating the <u>1987 Willamette River</u> <u>Greenway Plan</u>. The original plan, drafted back in the days of Mayor Bud Clark, set an ambitious goal to restore natural habitat and to increase public access to the banks and waterway.

Now the City is looking at the plan with renewed interest as they begin work on what is called the "River Plan/South Reach Project". This new plan will include updating the original Greenway Plan policies and regulations for the South Reach of the Willamette River (Ross Island Bridge to Dunthorpe). The new plan could include:

- Regulations on development near the riverbanks
- Reevaluating river floodplains and prioritizing projects to reclaim and restore those areas

It's possible that the River Plan could include regulations for recreational boaters. You can read more about the plan, and share your thoughts with the City's planners, *online*.

Meanwhile, down in Salem, the Oregon State Marine Board (OSMB, which also oversees the Columbia River) is presenting a few bills to the legislature.

- <u>HB 2351</u>: Authorizes OSMB to adopt special regulations to protect shoreline in the Willamette River Greenway
 - Translation: Lawmakers could decide that it's in the state's best interest to reduce or limit motorboat access to parts of the Willamette River in an effort to help with the restoration and protection of natural habitat

- **HB 2352**: Creates a towed watersports program
 - A new boater registration program geared toward owners of towed motorboats that includes hefty fines for violators
- **SB 47**: Waterway access account
 - Kayakers, canoeists, and rowboat enthusiasts, this one's for you: Requires anyone operating a nonmotorized boat to have a waterway access permit, but would eliminate the need for an invasive species permit.
- HB 2080: Updates OSMB fees, including your boater registration fee

If you'd like to learn more about what the OSMB has in store this year, Director Warren gave an agency overview to the House Natural Resources Committee in which he covered all of the bills the Marine Board will introduce this year. See his presentation online.

Thoughts? Concerns? Please feel free to share your reactions to these proposed bills with your local government official. You can also share your thoughts with me, your CRYA representative, and I'll pass your feedback along to the CRYA board so they know exactly which issues RCYC members are passionate about.

Educational Event

Sailing Knots, Knots, Knots, Knots... SUNDAY · MARCH 10TH · 10:00 AM · RCYC CLUBHOUSE

As sailors and boaters, we use various lines and depend on attaching those lines with knots. Being able to efficiently tie the correct knot for a specific application is a hallmark of a "Salty Dog", and a worthy goal.

It is intended that this event be lightly structured with an emphasis on helping each other learn to tie common and not so common knots. We will be teaching each other and start out with a brief introduction to line types, tools, and such.

The first hour is very beginner friendly. We will focus on the 7 essential knots for sailors outlined in the SAIL magazine article listed below, and will likely cover other common knots as time allows. This is your chance to get some handson help tying these knots if you are

less familiar tying them than you would like. If you know how to tie them, do come by and lend a hand for those who need a little guidance. Bring a 6' or so piece of 3/8" line to practice with. Double Braid is best.

The second portion will focus on tying soft shackles made from AmSteel Blue (Dyneema SK75 HMPE) and tied with a Button Knot. If you want to tie a few soft shackles, bring a length of 1/4" or 3/16" Amsteel line. If we have time we will take a look at the Bimini Twist and Worm Knot for fishing.
