

Vice Commodore's Report

Work hours are due. June 10th is the final day to report work hours for the first half of the year. The Club requires six hours be performed in each half of the year, for a total of 12 hours. After the 10th, all hours will count toward the 2nd half of 2019. This means that you will be charged for any hours that you are short of the required six hours. These hours are critical to our Club's health and appeal, and reduce our membership rates substantially. With labor rates being well above \$100 per hour, the cost to hire out this work would be substantial. A little help from us members goes a long way. I will send out a spread sheet soon with all hours recorded so you can check how many work hours you have.

One last note for the summer, if you are going on a trip and drive to the Club, do not park on the east end of the parking lot. Park at the west end, away from the main traffic area. It is quite inconsiderate to park your vehicle right in front of the ramps for a week or more when you are going on an extended cruise or race. It is consideration for others that makes our Club the best Club in Portland.

From the Rear

This isn't the type of article we normally want to see in the Foghorn, but it's important the membership be informed of this long-term, frustrating, but hopefully soon-to-be ending situation. The Club has been the reluctant moorage for a past member's neglected sailboat for nearly two years, and although it was abandoned that long ago, this past month we have officially posted the boat as "Abandoned". We have attempted to notify the owner to come remove their boat several times in the past to no avail. With this one last notification, if the boat is not removed, we will take up action with the Oregon State Marine Board to obtain official title to the boat. Once the Club has the title, we will hold an auction to sell the boat. The auction will be open to members and any interested persons and is presently scheduled to take place on Wednesday, May 29th at noon at the Club flagstaff.

The sailboat is an Ericson 25-Plus model designed by Bruce King, and according to our Moorage Chair and Port Captain, Loren Beach, "under all of that grime and neglect is actually a high-quality cruiser/racer". The successful bidder will have ten days to remove the boat from the moorage and will not be awarded title until such time it is evident the boat will actually depart the moorage.

The boat was moved from its slip at the end of Walk 3 to Walk 2a, Slip #2 so that it is easily available to potential bidders, and also close to the dewatering station should it need additional dewatering.

We looked into donating the boat to the Sea Scouts, but they are not taking in any boats at this time. So, if the boat is not sold, then the next action will be to part-out the boat, sell its usable salvaged components and then cut up and dispose of the hull. If you have any ideas or comments about the boat and this course of action, the Rear Commodore would be happy to hear from you.

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

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

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

RCYC BOATS ROMP THE OFFSHORE

Four RCYC boats crossed the bar May 9th and turned their bows north, racing in the CYC Oregon Offshore from Astoria to Victoria, BC. All four will return with honor, taking first, second, or third in their respective divisions.

The Ericson 33 *Margaret* and skipper David Shepherdson took first place in the competitive PHRF B fleet, with a corrected time of 41:25:40. Taking third place in PHRF B was the well-experienced Alan Bergen and crew on the C&C 35 Thirsty, with a corrected time of 44:49:42. Thirsty would have finished higher in the rankings, but Alan wisely chose not to fly the spinnaker down the Strait, given the 20-knot winds, pea-soup fog, and heavy freighter traffic.

Not so wise was the crew of **Chinook**, a Beneteau Idylle 11.5 skippered by yours truly, who opted to fly the chute all the way down the Strait. *Chinook* took full advantage of the Cruising class rules, which allow four hours of "free" motoring, to zip up the coast in the light airs on Friday, reaching the mouth of the Strait just as the PHRF A-1 leaders, including the 70-foot Rage, came blasting into the approaches and popped their chutes. Inspired, **Chinook** hoisted the light air spinny and chased after the leaders. As night fell, the wind increased and we swapped out for the 1.5 oz heavy air spinnaker. Then impenetrable fog descended, and we whomped along blind, staring at the AIS targets on the chartplotter and trying to stay clear of the shipping lanes. We opted not to try blindly sailing through Race Passage against the

ebb, and went the long way around. Then the wind shut off like a faucet, just as we exited the fog bank at dawn within two miles of the finish. A C&C 115 in PHRF A-1 emerged from the fog on our tail, and we vowed to finish ahead of them if it meant paddling with the dinghy oars. After an hour of all-hands-on-deck ooching and scooching, a waft

of wind took us across the line just ahead of the C&C. **Chinook** was the seventh boat to finish, taking first in Cruising class with an uncorrected time of 46 hours. What a great way to deliver your cruising boat to the northern cruising grounds!

The perennial Cruising class champion, Souffle and skipper Phil Lewis, was not far behind, after suffering a blown mainsail in the Strait. Phil plans to

repair the main and race in the Swiftsure on Memorial Day weekend, then cruise for a while before returning to PDX, to start planning the campaign to regain his Cruising class crown in the 2020 Oregon Offshore.

There are boats signed up already, but individuals may attend his morning chalk talk at the Club for an incredibly generous \$10.00 charge at the door. Portland seldom sees such sage wisdom. Sharing information widely will be good for all.





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OREGON OFFSHORE, ABOARD MARGARET

Our 2019 Oregon Offshore started in the good company of fellow RCYC members. Wind was very light at the start and for the first four hours and we were doing fairly well. To take advantage of the stronger offshore wind, we made one long starboard tack about 60 miles out to sea on Thursday and a port tack back to the race mark at Duntz Rock near Cape Flattery on Friday. At dusk on Friday, the wind died coming into Juan De Fuca Straight, a fog bank rolled in, and we had an anxious hour while the wind circled us and the current drew us relentlessly towards Duntz rock, but we passed eventually with room to spare. About an hour into the Straight, the wind gained considerably in strength from the West, and at 2:00am we raised the spinnaker. From then until 9:00am was a wild ride with true wind speed approaching 20kn by the end. Crossing the shipping lanes on a beam reach with the spinnaker pulling hard was particularly memorable (Seattle Traffic were notified, declared it safe to cross and confirmed that our AIS signature was visible). Broad reaching towards Race Rocks at one point we briefly hit 9kn surfing down a wave (highest speed seen by me to date on *Margaret*),

7-8 knots was about the average for a while. We doused the spinnaker at Race Rocks with a sigh of relief and turned north outside the rocks for Victoria. An hour later we popped out of the fog into a beautiful sunny day with blue sky, deep blue water, and behind us the white fog bank topped by the snowy Olympic Mountains. The wind gradually died as we neared Victoria and the chute went up again. About 50 yards from the finish, the very light wind did a 180 and the chute threatened to push us back; we got it down asap and a very slight current just barely pushed us over the line. Customs, followed by my wife Karen and friends, champagne, and hot towels greeted us in front of the Empress Hotel - lovely! **Chinook** was already docked and *Thirsty* came in shortly after, followed by Phil on **Souffle** with a torn mainsail ("it's only 19 years-old"). We didn't know we had won our division until the awards ceremony the next day at the Royal Victoria Yacht Club, a great Mother's Day surprise.

Margaret is named after my departed mother who loved to sail and was a successful dinghy racer; I think she would have loved it. **Thirsty** and **Chinook** also received awards — quite the clean up by RCYC! A big thanks to all my crew and especially "Ist Mate" Justin and for all the encouragement and help I have received from RCYC members, particularly Alan.
