

Moorage Matters

We must prepare for high wind events as we head into the winter months. Again, upgrade your dock lines to new 3-strand if they are old and crusty. Snubbers are needed for bow and stern lines. You need chafe gear where the line rubs against the edge of the deck or a chock. Tie down your dock box if you have one.

If you keep your roller furled genoa up, be very sure it is well tied with a line around the furled sail, and do not depend solely on the tension from the furling line to hold it. Also, cleat that furling line.

We recently had a dinghy stolen off one of the racks, so we say again: put a cable and lock on your dinghy. Plan B - take it home for the winter. The same thing applies for kayaks.

We presently have no openings for large boats, having just filled one. The waiting list has been relatively short but is growing quickly with the current influx of new members.

One question about terminology comes up regularly. Are slip assignments here "permanent" once you get assigned to 'your' slip? The answer lies in our primary moorage rule #1. In short, all slips may be assigned to any member boat, and no member has a "right" to any given slip. In this regard we are quite similar to many other yacht clubs where the members own all of the moorage, in common.

Rarely, a boat is moved to a different slip to better accommodate another boat. Usually, due to our particular slip geography, such moves are caused by a need for depth or width, and sometimes length.

When making assignments we try to be very flexible about boat length, as long as the boat can get in and out, and there is no impediment to neighbor boats on the same walk. As you will notice, each of our walks has a rough minimum and maximum boat length suggested, but sometimes we allow a longer or shorter boat, depending on what the members are bringing in.

Over time, the only noticeable change in boats seems to be beam. Lots of boats built in the last 20 years are quite wide, and this causes us to sometimes assign a pair of boats in a two-slip bay where one is thin, and other one is, well, not thin.

There are not as many members meandering around the docks during a pandemic, so remember to lock the ramp gate at sunset and lock all doors to the Clubhouse. Keep the shop locked when not using it.

Before the last Saturday work party date, be sure to wash your deck off. Dirt and soot with some added jet exhaust, makes a good growing medium for mold and crud in the winter.

Finally, November is when the state sends out two-year registration renewals. You can do this easily on-line, so do not put this off. Current stickers are required on your boat.

FOR ANYONE IN US WATERS Marine Safety Alert: Performing a VHF Marine Radio Check

The U.S. Coast Guard's Office of Auxiliary & Boating Safety (CG-BSX) has issued a new Marine Safety Information Bulletin (MSIB 20-20) related to performing a VHF Marine Radio Check.

Performing a VHF Marine Radio Check Sea Tow Automated Radio Check System no longer available:

For several years, Sea Tow operated an Automated Radio Check System, which was available on VHF Channels 24 to 28 for the benefit of mariners in over 130 locations. However, on October 2nd, 2020 that service was discontinued. How to test a VHF Radio using Rescue 21:


- The U.S. Coast Guard continues to offer an automated Digital Selective Calling (DSC) Test Call capability from each of its
 Rescue 21 coastal stations. All fixed mount marine radios certified by the Federal Communications Commission since 1999
 are required to have a DSC capability. All such radios sold since 2011 must also have a DSC test call capability. Marine radios
 transmitting and successfully receiving a response from a DSC test call can be expected to operate acceptably in the voice
 mode as well.
- To perform a DSC Test Call, enter the U.S. Coast Guard's coast station group identity "003669999" into the radio's DSC memory. Once entered and stored, a DSC test call can be made by executing the following three steps:
- Select "Test Call" from the radio's DSC menu,
- Select the USCG number entered into memory, and
- Transmit the call.
- The radio display should indicate when that test call is acknowledged and display the acknowledging station's nine-digit identity. That identity may be different than the group identity previously entered into memory.
- Please use VHF Channel 09 and do not use VHF Channel 16. VHF Channel 16 is not for the purpose of radio checks. Please use VHF Channel 09, which has been designated by the FCC as a boater's calling channel.

EDITORIAL: GETTING TO KNOW THE EXECUTIVE BOARD AND OF-FICERS AT ROSE CITY

RCYC Electoral Process

Of course, any active member has the right to make a nomination for a general vote.

Typically nominations are introduced, reviewed and voted at the October general meeting. This year, however, we could not establish a quorum in order to conduct the election for 2021 positions. More communications likely to come from the commodore on next steps.

As a reminder to the extraordinary effort that goes in holding these positions consider that a commodore typically spends 4-5 years on the Board going through other Board roles.

The Commodore is the highest-ranking officer effectively operating as President or general manager. This position oversees the overall organization of the Club as well as General Membership meetings.
