

But why stop there? Our BVI charter opened our eyes to tropical cruising. What about an RCYC flotilla to the Sea of Cortez this November or December? Charter some boats out of La Paz, explore the warm blue waters together or on your own, meet up at a remote desert island anchorage for sundowners? A dream, yes, but doable if there is a will.

OK, time to turn to the here and now. Folks, we have Trouble in River City, and Trouble starts with T and there is a T in meeting. Yes, I'm talking about the General Meeting. During the pandemic we switched to Zoom. With return to a semblance of normalcy, we resumed in-person General Meetings, with a Zoom option for those who could not attend. Trouble is, the vast majority of members seem to prefer to attend General Meetings via Zoom, sitting at home sipping a sundowner, rather than braving the traffic and the long dark roads to get to the Club. I get it. Zoom is darn convenient. But over-reliance on Zoom is threatening to kill an important part of the social vibe at our Club.

What to do? Some have urged eliminating hybrid meetings and going back to only in-person General Meetings. I think that is the wrong approach. The genie is out of the bottle, and we should not deny members who want to participate in General Meetings a convenient opportunity to attend. But we can do more to encourage in-person attendance.

Part of the problem, I suspect, is the dark discouraging winter mid-week weeknight venue. Another part is the lack of social incentive to attend in person. So I propose an experiment designed to remedy both those discouraging aspects. I will seek Board approval to move the March General

Meeting to Saturday, March 25, at 3:00 pm. This follows a work party, so there may be a number of people down at the Club anyway who choose to stay for the Meeting. The Club will provide food, snacks, and beverages, and there may be music before or after. In other words, it will be something of a party, on a weekend afternoon instead of a cold dark weeknight evening. And yes, we will Zoom the Meeting so those who cannot attend may participate. But I guarantee it will be more fun to attend in person.

If this experiment is a failure, then I think the logical course is to go with Zoom only General Meetings. It is not worth the trouble of setting up all the hybrid gear for just a few in-person attendees. And even if the March General Meeting is well attended, I think it is likely that we will return to Wednesday night meetings in the warmer, brighter months. Summer weekends are too precious to waste on meetings!

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## “Sécurité, sécurité, sécurité”

Not only a cry for help across the radio waves concerning the safety of life at sea, or on the river – we have security concerns of our own at RCYC. In the past year, there have been two known instances where RCYC members have had vehicles stolen from our gated parking lot.



In a 2022 article in the New York Times, journalist Mike Baker wrote that “vehicle theft is up across the country – there was a 17% increase from 2019 to 2021.” And the Portland metro area is among the leaders of this spike. The city ranks fifth in the U.S. for car thefts per 100,000 people, above San Francisco and Seattle.”

This harsh and sad reality is affecting many of us (in the past six months my own vehicle has been vandalized with intent to steal three times) but at RCYC there are actions we can take to help navigate this new normal.

We are in the process of finishing the installation of a taller, more secure fence. Generally, we are all cognizant of the importance of consistently closing the locked gate to the marina and being aware of individuals on the premises we're not familiar with, and asking about the purpose of their visit.

### What more can we do?

A number of RCYC members have suggested that we increase security in our parking lot by deactivating the pressure pad in front of the entrance/exit gate and installing an exit trigger via a keypad, card, or fob. This way, potential car thieves might get in, but they won't be able to get out.

There is precedence for this approach to increasing security up and down Marine Drive. A few other yacht clubs including CRYC and Bid Eddy (marina and gated community) require key cards to enter and exit.

I will be partnering with CJ Volesky and other RCYC members to investigate costs and processes before making a proposal to the Board.

To be sure, installing an exit trigger raises some questions – and that's where you come in. **We want to hear from you! What thoughts, questions, or concerns do you have?**




